*The matter having been referred to the Master of the Workhouse, he made a statement as follows: -*

*James Lee is not the contractor for the supply of tea, but Patrick Flynn is. I sent a Board Order to the contractor on the 10<sup>th</sup> inst. for a chest of tea, & having failed to supply it up to the 16<sup>th</sup> inst. I ordered 60 lbs. of tea elsewhere.*

*A complaint similar to this was before the Guardians at meeting on the 20<sup>th</sup> inst. when the following note was made on it: - "The Master was justified in the course he adopted."*

*Order. In future a fortnight's notice to be given for the supply of a chest of tea.*

17<sup>th</sup> Apr. '12. From Mr. P. Flynn, tea contractor, returning a Paying Order for £5-9-10, his invoice for a chest of tea supplied to the Workhouse amounted to £7-10-0.

Glunnamaddy, stating that the boy Peter Murphy, who was boarded out with Michael McDonoughlin of Corcullen, left his foster parents a few days ago & went back to his old home, James Whytes of Cashed. He went to Whytes' to compel him to go back & though he went beyond, moral suasion he failed. Mrs Whyte promised to turn him away but he is satisfied she will not do so. Recommending that the boy be taken back to Galway as it would not do to have the authority of the Visiting Committee flouted, Michael McDonoughlin will not take him back now. That he cannot undertake to send him unless he accompanies him, as when taking him from Whytes' he was obliged to do. The boy Thomas Fenton tells him that matters are improved in his home & that he is quite content to stay there.

Read Letter from *L.G.B. No 19368/12*, dated *23<sup>rd</sup> April, 1912*,

stating that the Board have had before them the resolution of the Guardians on the 10<sup>th</sup> inst. requesting the Board to re-consider the decision conveyed in their letter of the 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. calling for the resignation of Dr. Glynn, Medical Officer of the Turloughmore Dispensary District.
