3rd Jan. 1913. Enclosing extracts from a report received from their Medical Inspector, Sir A. MacBullagh, relating to his recent inspection of the Dispensary Districts of the Union. Requesting that the several important matters adverted to therein may receive the Guardians consideration.

Extracts from report dated 30th Dec. 1912.

Salway No 1 Disp. Dist.

In last report there were 80 Vaccination defaulters returned. The Vaccination Acts are efficiently administered in the District, except that there are too many defaulters.

Salway No 2 Disp. Dist.

In last report 110 Vaccination defaulters were returned. The Vaccination Acts are efficiently administered in the District, except that there are too many defaulters.

Moycullen Disp. Dist.

The Dispensary buildings are in fairly good order, but the woodwork requires repainting. There are no sanitary conveniences for use of the patients. I think it would be desirable that the Guardians should consider the question of building a Dispensary Residence for this District; the accommodation is not good, & a residence would be an inducement to a Medical man to remain in the District.

Spiddal Disp. Dist.

Except that Spiddal Dispensary is damp the Dispensary buildings are suitable, & in good order. There are no sanitary conveniences for use of the patients. The Returns, Form L, are not always forwarded by the Medical Officer to the L.S. Board within 21 days after the end of each half-year. Medicine supplies are not ordered quarterly, but three times yearly. A complete list of all instruments provided for Dispensary use is not kept.

Lurloughmore Disp. Dist.

There are no sanitary conveniences for use of the patients. Medicine supplies are not ordered quarterly, but three times a year. There is a press at Lackagh kept for poisonous medicines, but the lock is out of order. There were 52 Vaccination defaulters returned in last report. There are too many defaulters of the Vaccination Acts in the District, otherwise they are efficiently administered.

Guardians' Observations.

The inclemency of the weather interferes with Vaccination.

No application has been made for a Dispensary Residence in the Moycullen Dispensary District.

Order. The attention of the owner of the Dispensary at Spiddal to be drawn to the remark re dampness, & of the owner of Moycullen Dispensary re repainting of the woodwork.

The attention of the Medical Officers of the Spiddal & Lurloughmore Disp. Dist., to be directed to remarks of the Inspector re ordering of medicines, &c. A new lock to be put on the press for poisonous medicines at Lackagh Dispensary.

4th Jan'y. '13. From Dr. Salmon, Medical Officer of the Craunmore Disp. Dist. in explanation of the remarks of the Analyst re error on label of a specimen of a drug sent for analysis: "the solution was the ordinary & not the strong, & is entered as such in the blue form. The mistake must have been mine in writing the label, no harm done however".

8th Jan'y. '13. From the Relieving Officer of the "Inverloughmore Disp. Dist. reporting that the Midwife resumed duty after leave of absence.

That on the evening of the 2nd inst. she received a telegram from the Medical Officer asking her to arrange for the removal to the Fever Hospital of a child named Pat. Burke from Inagarrane, suffering from Scarlatina. She had the ambulance at the patient's home on the following morning but the parents declined to allow the removal to Hospital. Dr. Sandys of Galway was in attendance on the child & warned her of the risk of removal. She applied to the nearest magistrate, Mr. French, for an order for compulsory removal & he declined to give the order. The child remains in his home.

The Guardians approved of the action taken by the Relieving Officer.

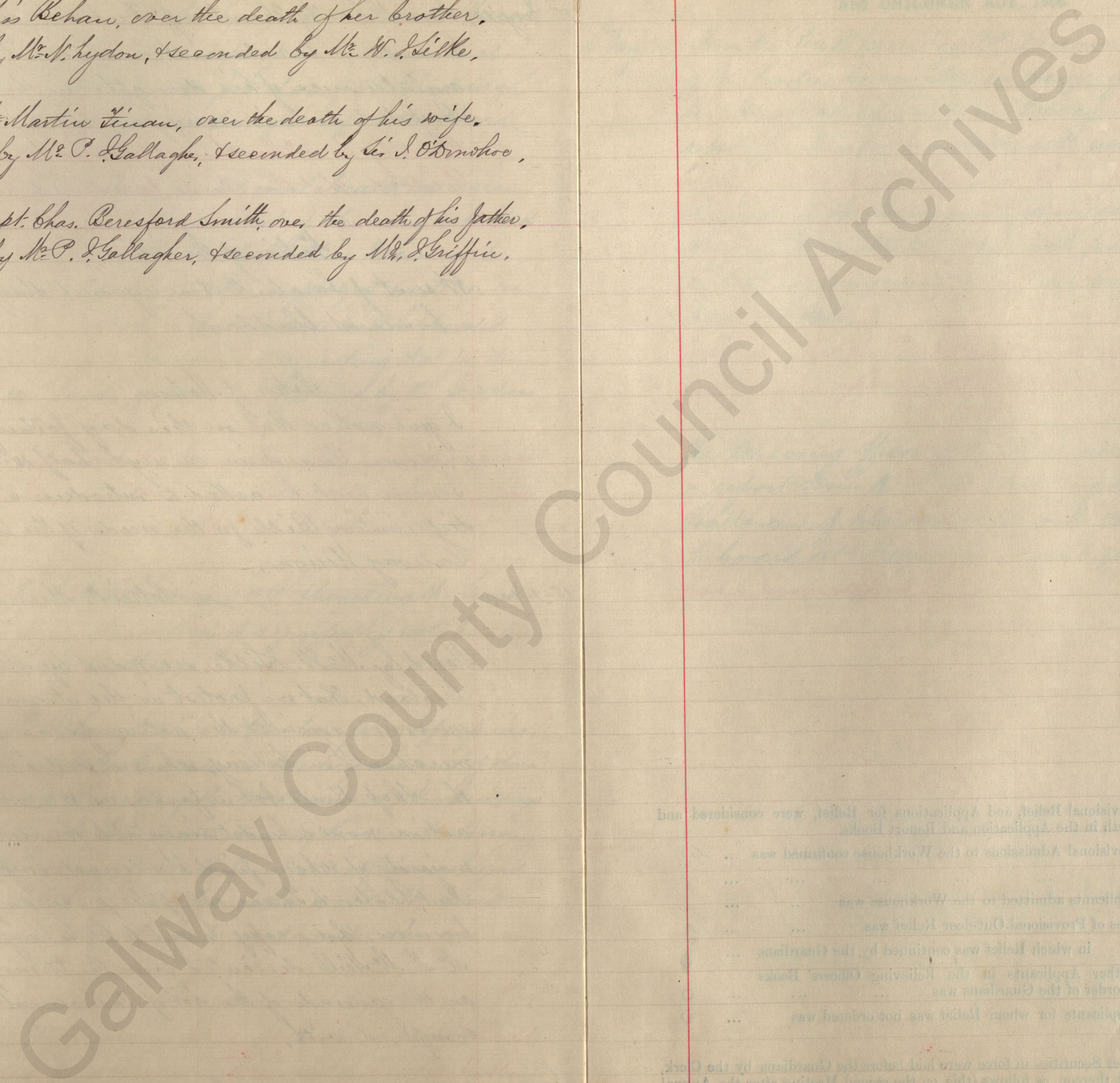

14th Jan'y 13, from Mrs P. Burke, owner of the Dispensary at *Lackagh*, in the *Eurlongmore Disp. Dist.* informing the Guardians that she had placed a lock on the press for poisonous medicines, as requested.

Applying for a ton of coal for use in the Dispensary, as she has to keep two fires on Mondays & one on Fridays.

Mr N. Lydon promised to give notice that this application be considered at meeting on the 29th inst. but forgot to do

so.

The clerk called attention to Form H furnished by Dr Glynn, Medical Officer of the *Eurlongmore Disp. Dist.* in which he certified that between the dates, 27-7-12. & 2-12-12, he had successfully vaccinated 65 persons in his district. He found on examining the Vaccination Register that 40 of these cases were registered in the half-year ended 30th Sept. last, payment of fees therefor being now statute barred. Also that 8 out of the 65 were registered as having been performed by Dr D. V. Morris while acting as temporary Medical Officer in the *Disp. Dist.* that he had written to Dr Glynn on the subject & received a reply as follows:—

14-1-13

"I always thought that so long as I was within a half year's limit I was entitled to be paid for fees within that period, this much I know is that the Guardians cannot accept fees for vaccinations while acting as substitute.

Another communication from Dr Glynn.

"Re the case of Burke & Scarlatina. One often hears of the danger of Influenza developing into Pneumonia, but the idea of Bronchitis developing into Scarlatina bangs Ravagher, such is the new theory propounded of late. A somewhat similar case took place about twelve months ago. The patient Sherrett, Claregalway, suffered from Typhoid Fever. The same gentleman called it Gastritis. I told Dr O'Halley to see the case. He pronounced it Typhoid. The patient was unwell

for over six weeks. As much for Gastritis, now as to the patient Burke. He was undoubtedly suffering from Scarlatina & not from Bronchitis, his body being covered all over with a rash. It is stated the R.O. did her duty. I say she did not do her duty, in allowing the man to return at the dictation of an outsider whilst I was within a stones throw of the locality. I think that there is an order passed that the man is not to be sent for, ^{or} a patient removed without the consent of the Medical Officer of the district. That rule is not complied with in my place. In concluding I may mention that there is consternation in the neighbourhood as an epidemic of Scarlatina broke out there some years ago, which swept away a number of people amongst them being the P.P. Mr. Keaveny & a brother of St. Wade.

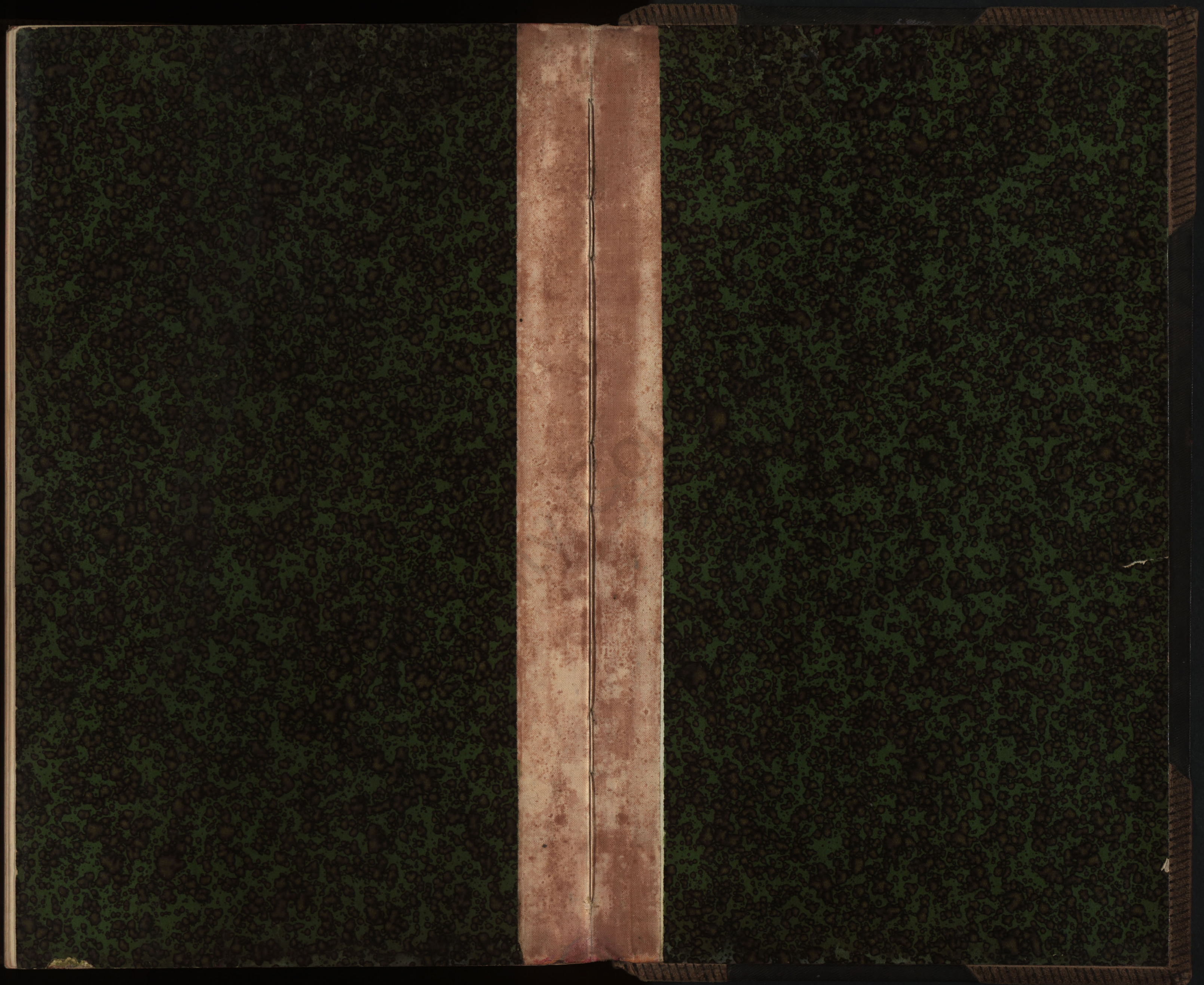

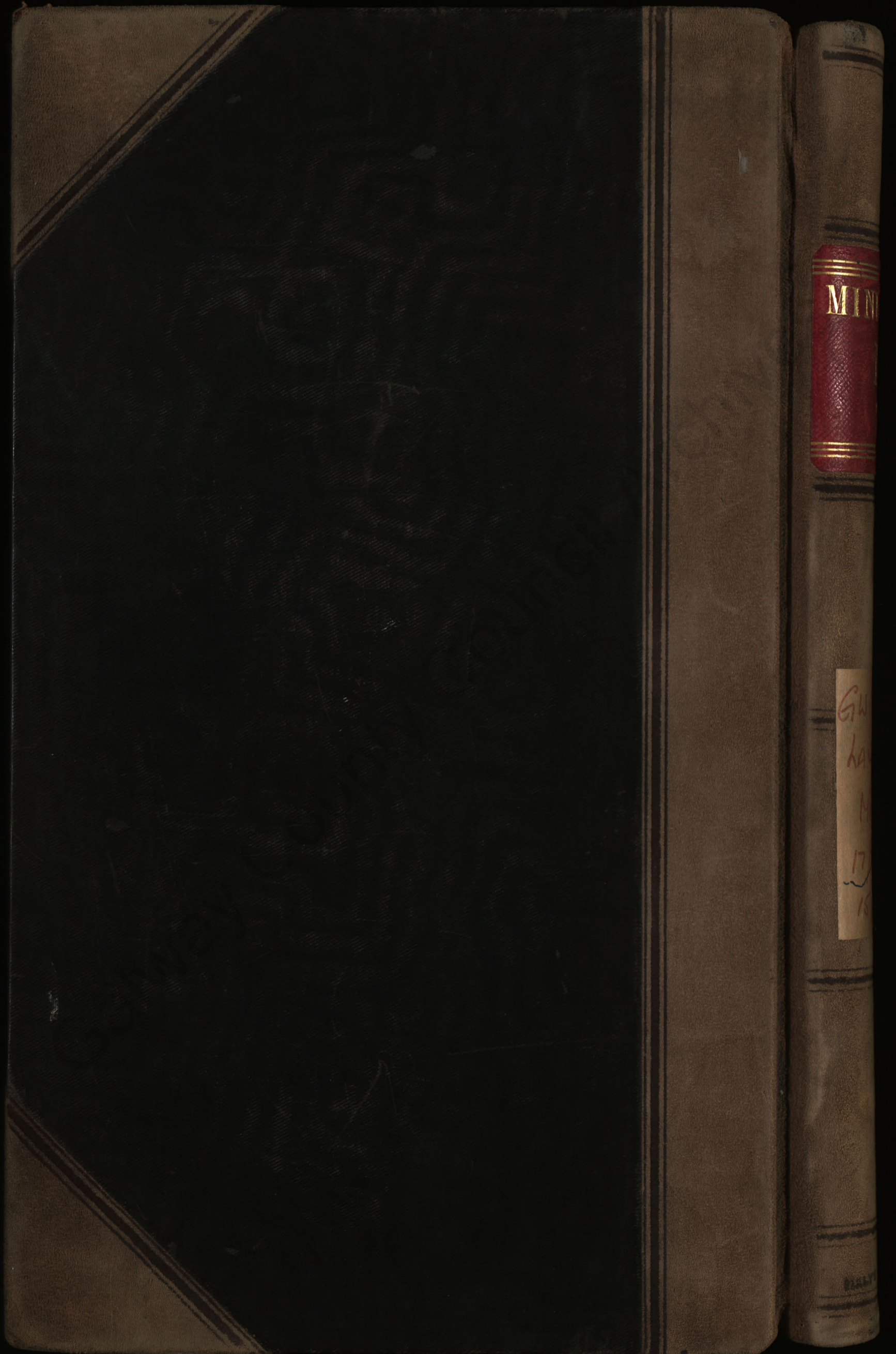
