THE PAUPER CHILDREN (IRELAND) ACTS,

15th Sept. '12, Fr. Rev. W. Conway, Chairman of the Ladies Committee for children boarded out & hired out from Salway Workhouse in the Parish of Glenamaddy, stating that on the 9th inst. he visited the school attended by M. Lee & Maloney Carey, boarded out-children, & found that during the previous 2 months they had been absent 11 & 12 days respectively. That he sent the foster parents a solemn warning that the children would be removed from their custody, & next morning he met Carey & his foster mother driving to Glenamaddy, suggesting, as a punishment, the withholding of allowance for each day's absence of a child from school, or in some more drastic manner as seems best to the Guardians.

The Guardians adopted the suggestion to withhold the allowance for each day the child is absent from school through default of the foster parent—except on reasonable grounds.

The Guardians ignored the very trifling difference in price, & gave the contract to Mr. Cunningham, who was contractor for past year & had given satisfaction.

Mr. Lawless entered a protest against the arrangement of names being removed from samples & numbers substituted therefor, although such arrangement was in accordance with a resolution passed by the Guardians at meeting on the 31st Augt. 1910. He contended that notice of motion should have been given. His protest having been ruled out of order he retired

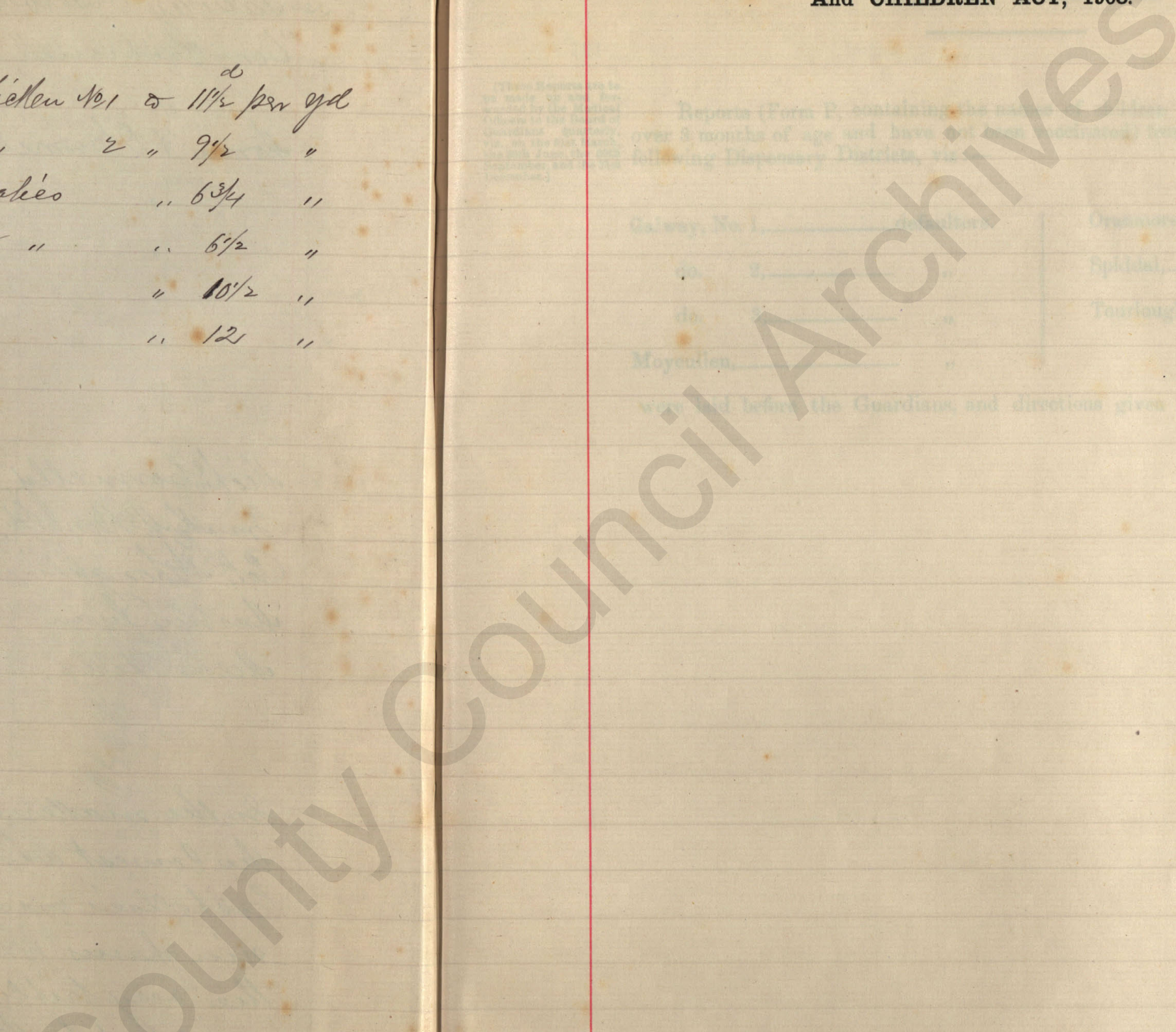
