Resolved—That we view with alarm the decision of the United States Government not to allow the importation of Irish Potatoes into the United States on the ground that our potatoes are infected with Black Scab. This Board, being composed of practical farmers, can assure the United States Department of Agriculture that there is no disease in the potato crop in this Union, & they respectfully ask that Department to remove their restriction at the earliest possible moment.
