I find on examining Martin Murray for measurement for an artificial limb for amputation below left knee, that the stump is bent at an angle, & it would be impossible to make a leg that would fit him, as he is. Under the circumstances the best course for him would be to go to the Orthopaedic Hospital, Dublin, when the stump would be set right, & he could be measured & fitted by the man who is making the limb. Moved by Mr. Gallagher, seconded by Mr. Griffin, & Resolved, that the course recommended by Dr. Colahan be adopted.
