The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon as follows:—

During the past week it came under my notice that an inmate named Delia Regan was admitted to the house on the 30th Aug. last & although having left the house was not discharged, she was subsequently admitted on the 3rd & 5th of October & discharged on the 4th & 13th of Oct. respectively. She was further admitted on the 11th of Aug. for which admission she was discharged on the 6th inst. Immediately observing the error I had her name removed off the books, I may mention that this woman was admitted & discharged on several occasions during the past 12 months. On a few occasions recently in counting the house I found the numbers correct, & the only reason I can assign for not detecting this error is that it frequently occurs that a hospital patient sleeps in the infirm part of the house, & one must have been counted which would account for this duplicate entry.

The Guardians consider this explanation satisfactory.

Order. The inmates of the Workhouse to be supplied with the usual extra fare on St. Patrick's Day & Easter Sunday.

Dr. McDonogh, Medical Officer of the Workhouse, called attention to the dangerous practice of the Schoolmaster sending schoolboys into the Fever Hospital grounds on messages. He caught a boy on the grounds when Diphtheria & Scarlatina patients were in the Fever Hospital.

Order. The attention of the Master of the Workhouse to be directed to this complaint. The Schoolmaster to be cautioned against a repetition of this offence.

Sanctioning the payment of remuneration of £4-4-0 a week to Dr. J. J. Waters for his services as temporary substitute for Dr. Lynn in his capacity as Medical Officer & Medical Officer of Health of the Turloughmore Disp. Dist.

11th Mar. '14. From Dr. H. McDonogh, Medical Officer, stating that last season he presented flowering plants & seeds for the grounds of the Galway Dispensary, & found that the seeds did not produce anything having been eaten up by fowl belonging to the Dispensary Porter. When he left the Dispensary the fowl were let out on the grounds. He considers it objectionable to have fowl so near the maternity wards. They were objected to once before as they disturbed the patients.

Referred to a Committee of the Guardians in attendance at this meeting to inspect the place & furnish a report.

11th Mar. '14. He has been 24 years in the service of the Board of Guardians & he expects extra remuneration for practically double duty, & the risk he runs in cleaning up after

the visits of the Tuberculosis patients. He refused an offer of £2 a year made to him by the Tuberculosis Committee. Unless the Guardians compel him he will refuse to do any further work for the Committee.
