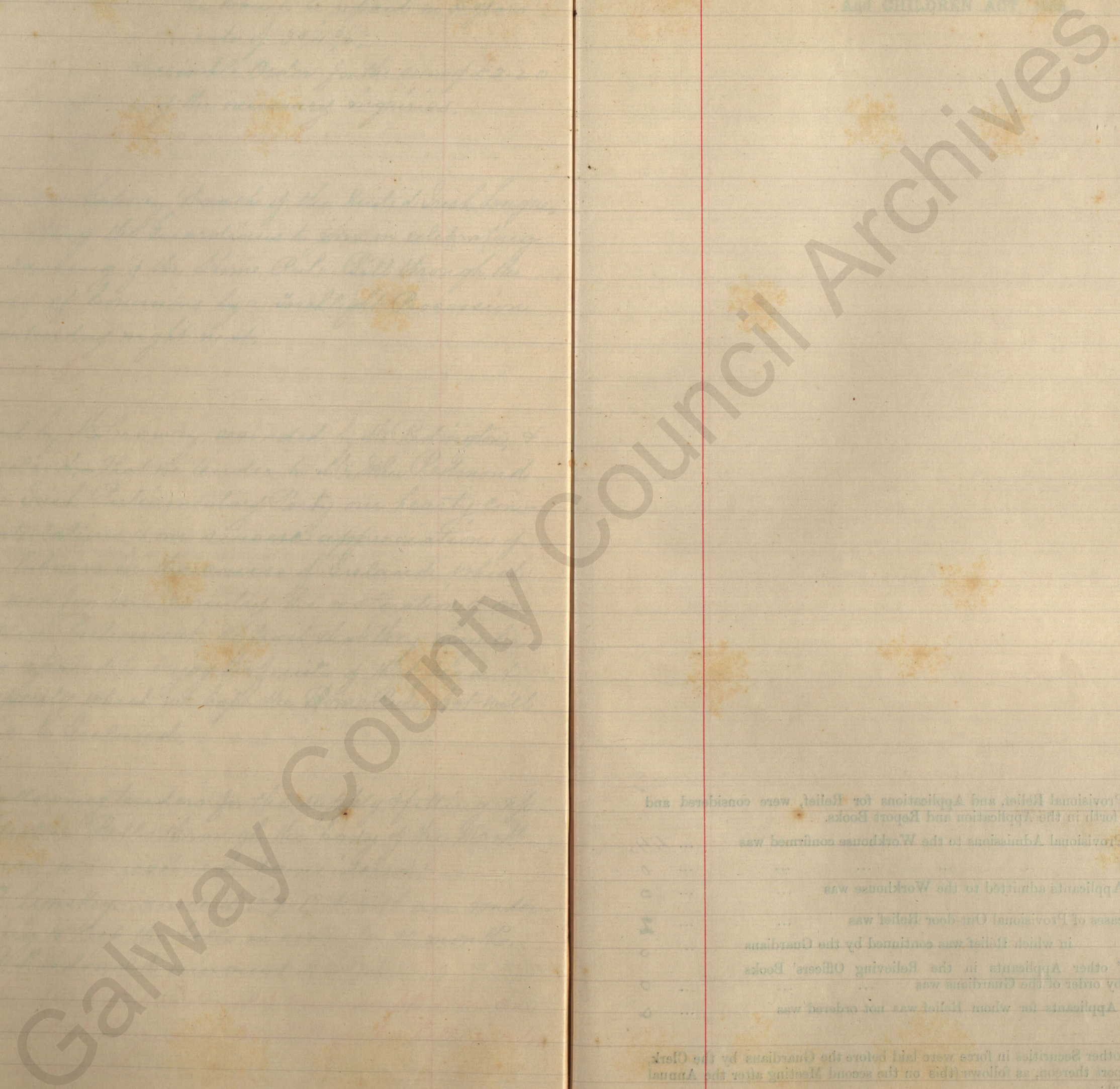

Read Letter from *Dr. M. O'Brien*, dated *26th May 1914*

(Medical Officer of Galway Disp. Dist. (Irish Islands)) stating, in reply to the Guardians' inquiry, that he does not mean to do locum while on vacation. Neither did he last year.

27th May '14 from *Mr. Allan Macdonald*, Architect for the building of a Dispensary & Residence for the *Moycullen Disp. Dist.* stating in reply to the Guardians' inquiry, that he could not take up the position of Builder.

Messrs. the Chairman, Faller, Griffin & Crowley were appointed a committee to confer with *Mr. Macdonald* as to alteration of the specification of this work. The meeting to be held tomorrow at 11 a.m.

The Relieving Officer for the *Turloughmore Disp. Dist.* reported that *Dr. Lession* acted as substitute for *Dr. Lynn*, Medical Officer, at the *Amaghdown Dispensary* on the *22nd inst.*

Mr. A. Macbullaigh, L.S. Medical Inspector, called attention to the fact that *Nurse Lee* of the *Moycullen Disp. Dist.* left her district before her substitute took up duty, which was quite irregular.

Also that she was allowed, ^{as previous} vacation so late as *December last*.

A Guardian explained that the vacation applied for in December last was on the occasion of the death of her aunt.

Mr. A. Macbullaigh also called attention to the prolonged illness of *Dr. Kirwan*, Medical Officer of the *Spiddal Disp. Dist.* & suggested that the Guardians express an opinion that if he tenders his resignation they will favourably consider his claims for superannuation.

*The Guardians acted upon this suggestion & the Clerk was directed to communicate with *Dr. Kirwan* on the subject.*
