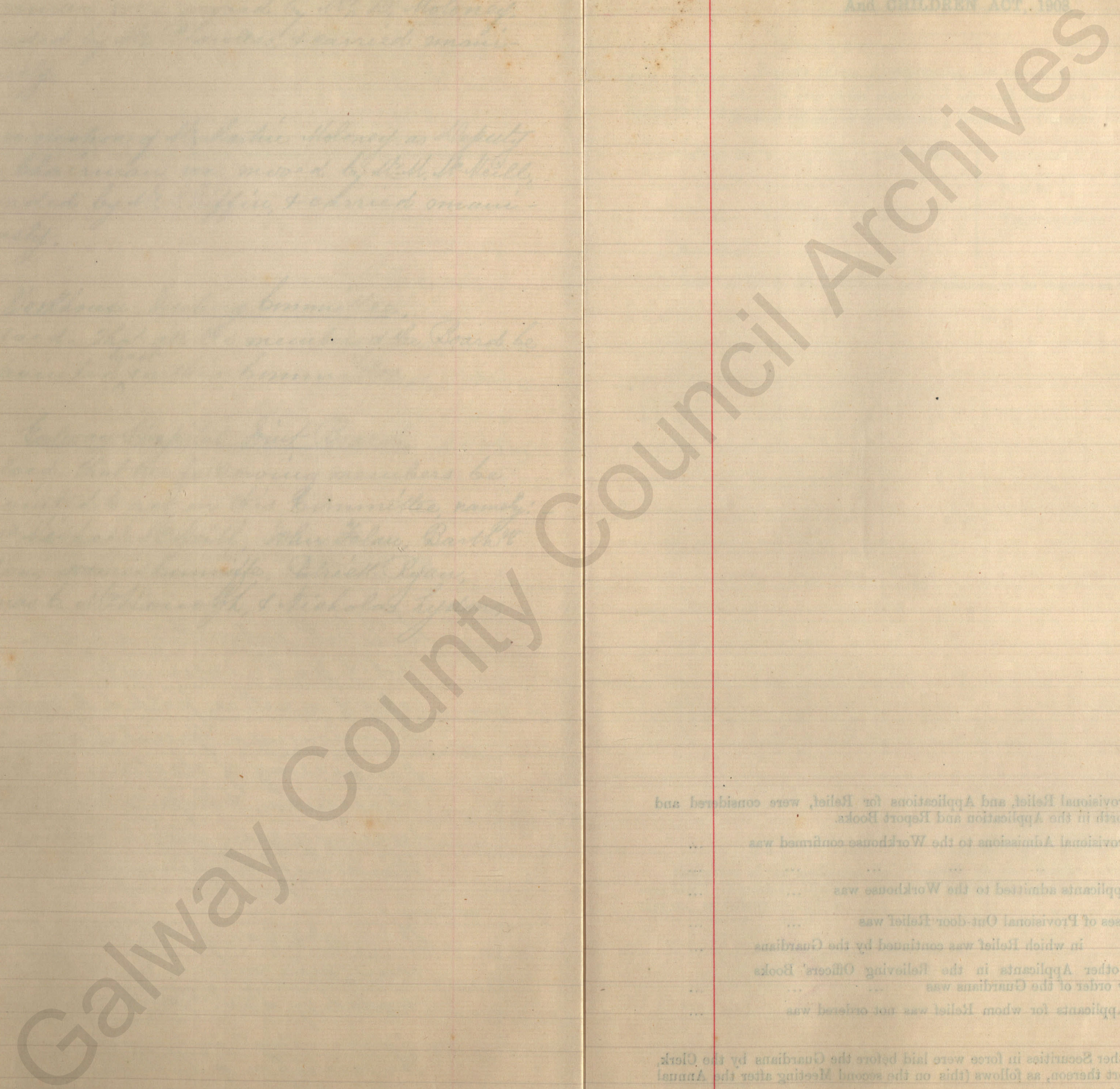

Treacy promised never to carry a stick again, & expressed great regret at having committed the assault, & requested the Guardians to deal
