Order. The attention of the Medical Officers to be drawn to this matter, with a request that the services of the probationer nurses and temporary wardmaid be dispensed with.

The Clerk also drew attention to the large number of patients in the Workhouse Hospital receiving "Special" diets, 34 out of a total of 75, although the new Diets which came into operation on 1st October last, were supposed to be suitable for almost every class of patient. He (Clerk), in his recent Estimate, reduced the allowance for maintenance and clothing by £600, and unless the new Scale of Diets are more strictly adhered to, he greatly feared the amount provided for in the Estimate, ^{will} ~~would~~ be exceeded.

Order. The Medical Officers and Head Nurse to be requested to adhere as far as possible, to the new Diet Scale, also to use every means in their power for keeping down expenditure in the Hospital, during this very trying time on the ratepayers.

That his Assistant is hereby appointed to discharge his duties at the usual remuneration of £2-2-0 per week.

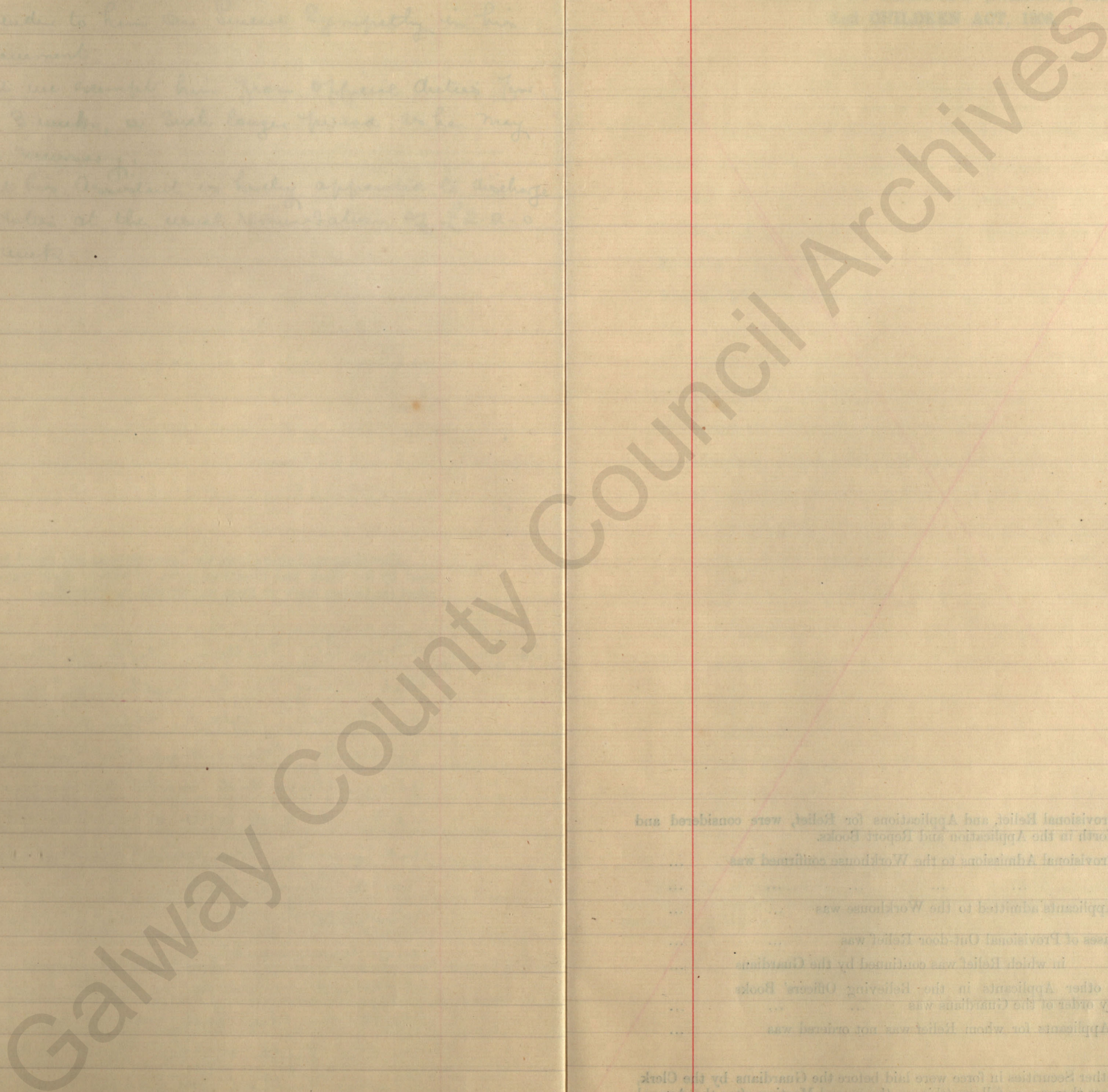
