- 20th ultimo. The Services of Mary O'Leary, temporary Wardsmaid in the Fever Hospital, were dispensed with.
- 21st " I resumed duty as Master after leave of absence.
- 22nd " The Schoolmaster was confined to his room for 2 days suffering from a cold. I had a man in charge of the boys.

- 1st instant. Wardsmaid Maggie Connolly, left on expiration of a month's notice. I employed Lizzy Kelleher temporarily at same remuneration, pending permanent appointment. *(This girl was appointed permanently, on probation, at Guardians Meeting today.)*
A W. L. Basin is required in the Hospital. It will cost about £1-7-0

2nd February, '15 Stating that they understand that Assessments being at the rate of 2^d in the pound on the valuation, were made on 21st November last by the Board of Management of Galway Hospital, on the several Contributory Unions of the County, in order to meet liabilities of the hospital up to 31st March, 1916. Giving a detailed Statement of the estimated assets and liabilities, from which it would appear that only a precarious balance of £70 will stand in favour of the Hospital on 31st March, 1916, if the expenditure is rigidly confined to the estimate, and the receipts, which are principally based on the assessment for financial year 1915-16, prove to be as estimated.
