Read Letter from L. G. B. No. 42,006, dated 20th August, 1914.

Circulars addressed to all Poor Law Medical Officers, pointing out that difficulty may be experienced by Contractors at the present juncture in keeping their Stocks up to the normal Standard, owing to the fact that many of the drugs are obtained from abroad and that manufacturers' Stocks of dressings have been depleted by the requirements of the Military Authorities. Impressing on Medical Officers the necessity for the exercise of economy, especially as regards the articles mentioned on the enclosed list, and also as regards Surgical dressings, Contractors have been authorised to reduce the demands for any of these articles, where they find it impossible to supply the full amount ordered, having regard to their obligations to other Users. The Board feel sure that Medical Officers will loyally co-operate in this matter and that they will order as small supplies as possible at present.

21st August. From the Returning Officer of the Galway No. 3 (Arann Islands) Dispensary District, reporting that the Medical Officer, D. Dr. O'Brien, resumed duty after vacation on that date.

21st August. From D. Loftus, Med. Officer of Spiddal Dispensary District, pointing out that there is no house available for a Doctor's Residence, except the one occupied by the late D. Kirwan, and it will be sold by Auction on the 31st inst.

It would be very suitable as a permanent Dispensary Residence, and requesting the Guardians to consider the advisability of purchasing it for this purpose.

Arrangements have been made to summon an Extraordinary Meeting for 29th inst., to consider the matter.

26th August. From D. Glynn, Medical Officer of Inveraghmore Dispensary District, pointing out with reference to D. Water's claim for 19 vaccinations performed whilst, ^{acting} as his substitute, that he (D. Glynn) had to re-vaccinate about half the number and inspect the remainder, also to enter them in Vaccination Register.

It has been given to understand that Bawnmore Farm, on which the Guardians were anxious to secure a site for a Dispensary and Residence, has now been sold to the C. D. Board.

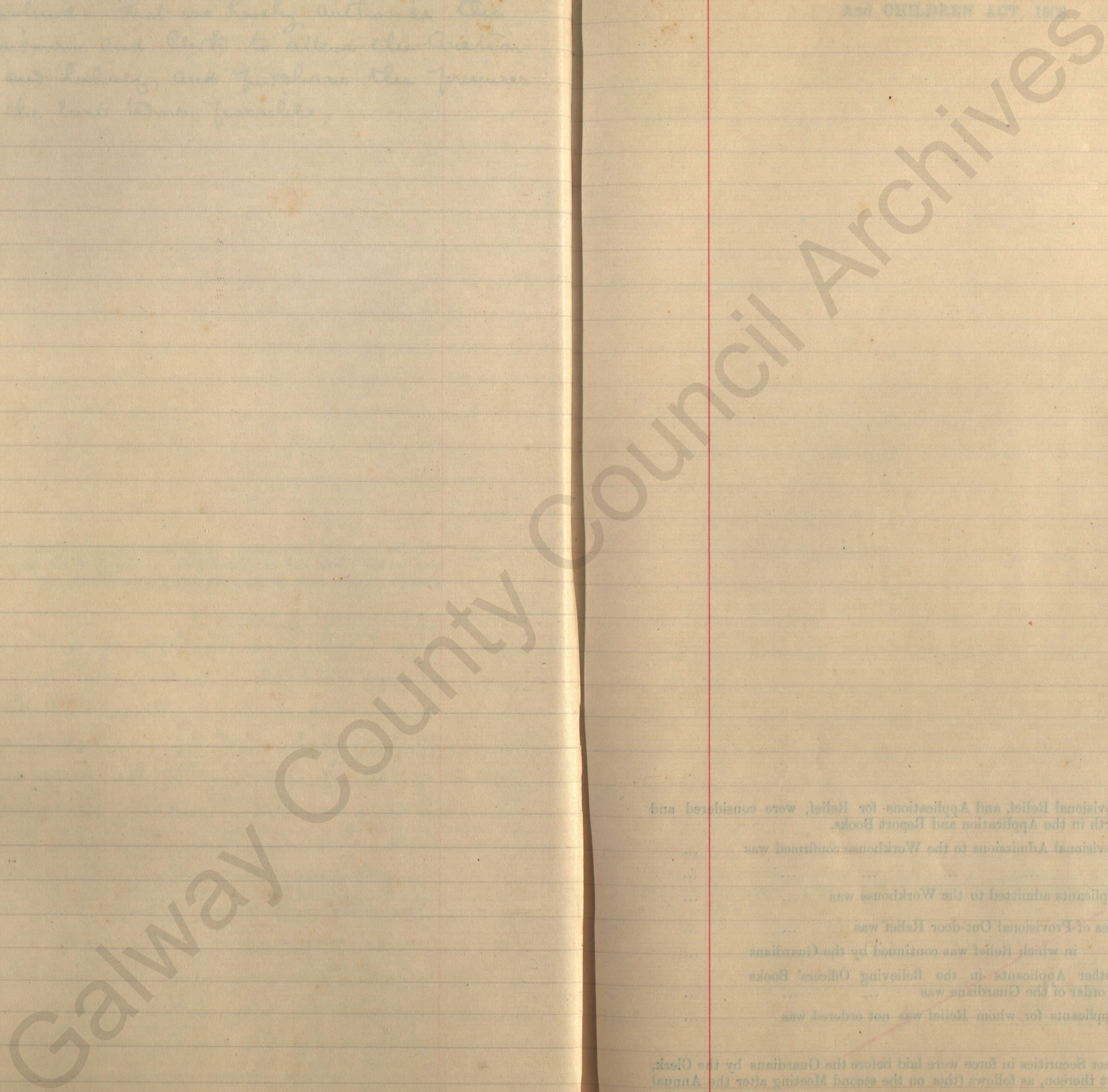
