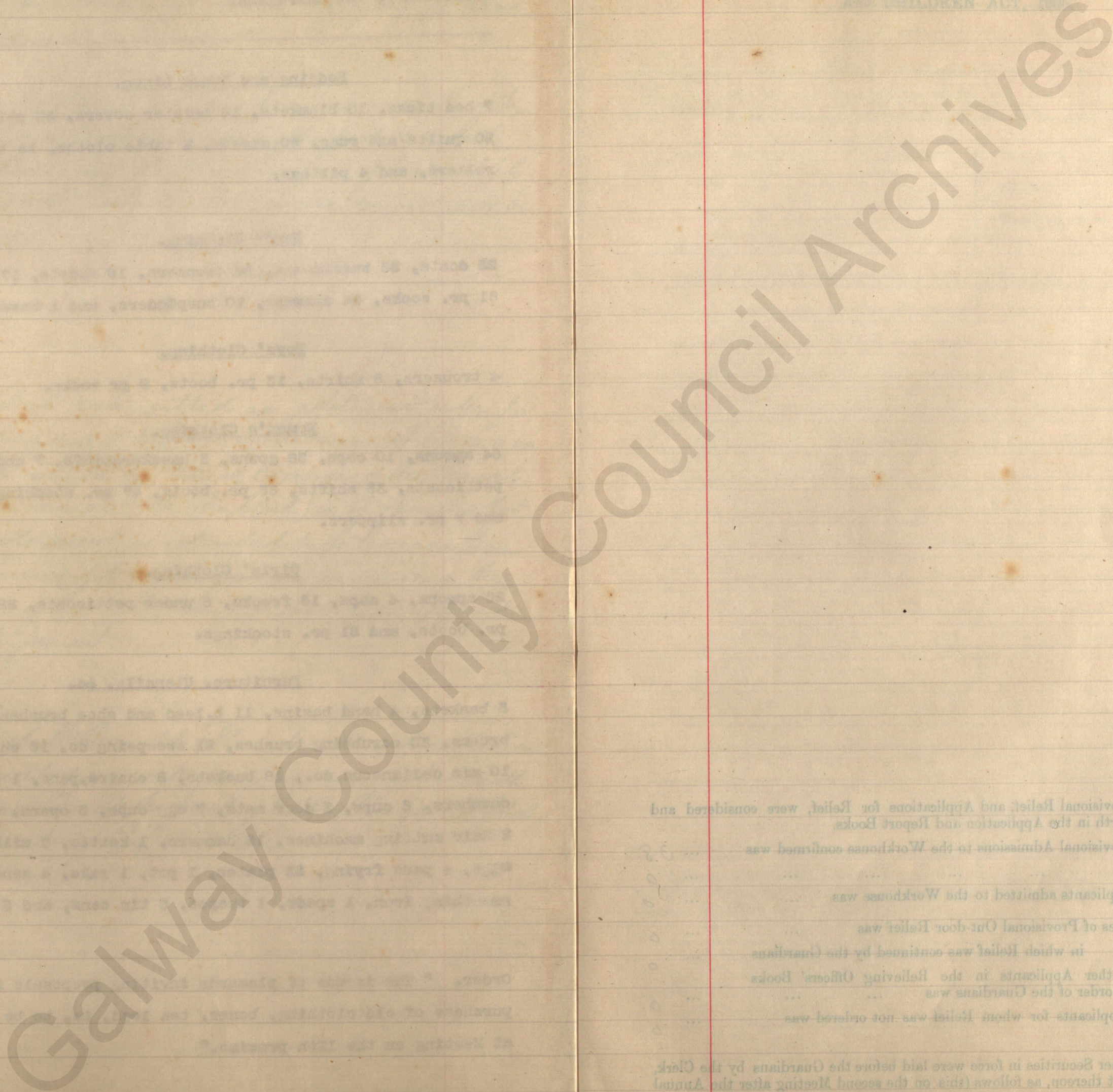

Read Letter from Mess^{rs} Royleau & Boyd, dated 22nd Oct 1914,

stating that the goods recently supplied to Cahoy, N^o. 3 Disp. Dist. have been priced in accordance with contract rates, enclosing a copy of same invoice with current list-prices, showing the items which have risen materially in price in consequence of the European War. This course has been decided upon after consultation with the L. G. Board & the items advanced are amongst those referred to in their circular letter of the 15th inst.

Requesting that the duplicate invoice be preserved as on completion of existing contract it is their intention to ask payment of the difference between the two amounts, & they think it better to intimate this now rather than that the matter should be left in abeyance until the contract terminates in March next. The circumstances being exceptional & entirely beyond their control they trust the Guardians will see the fairness of their proposal, & meet them in the matter as suggested in their circular letter of the 15th inst.

27th Oct '14, From Dr. Cannon, Medical Officer of the Drummore Disp. Dist, stating that having been obliged to leave for Dublin on the 26th inst. on urgent private business, & being unable to return until next day, he signed the Relieving Officer. He finds that it was arranged that Dr. Waters should
