Gallagher, seconded by Mr. Cooke, & carried.

The Clerk to the Galway County Hospital applied for orders from the Guardians for admission to the Hospital of John Sheridan, John Grant, Winnie Burke, & Patrick Hession, all of whom were admitted as accident cases.

Refused, as the Guardians consider that they should have been brought to the Workhouse Hospital.

Moved by Mr. M. Cooke, seconded by Mr. V. Lydon, & Resolved. That we beg to call the attention of the Local Government Board to the fact that at a very representative meeting on the 16th inst. which was specially summoned to take the matter into consideration, the Guardians in attendance were unanimous in voting an increase of $5\frac{1}{2}$ a week in the salary of the Boiler Attendant at the Workhouse, owing to increased duties by reason of the introduction of the new dietary & bathing arrangements. Since his

appointment this official has discharged his duties in a most satisfactory manner. On these grounds we request the L. S. B. to reconsider their decision & sanction the increase unanimously voted to him by the Guardians.
