- 12<sup>th</sup> inst. Maternity Nurse Carolan resumed duty after illness & the services of her substitute were dispensed with.
- 20<sup>th</sup> " On recommendation of the Medical Officer I applied to the County Hospital for two Probationer Nurses, but only one was available, Kathleen Bolton, who came. I wired to Dublin for a trained nurse & Nurse Margaret M. O'Reilly came & took up duty on the 21<sup>st</sup> inst. Remuneration, £1-11-6 a week with rations.
- 23<sup>rd</sup> " The Boiler ~~inspected~~<sup>or inspected</sup> the Steam Boiler, Lizzie Kelleher, Hardsmaid, was admitted to Hospital as a patient. An inmate is doing her duty.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively), as follows:—

- 13152/15. } Transmitting questions for answers respecting  
12<sup>th</sup> March. } the person who may be appointed as Hardsmaid in the Workhouse in place of Lizzie Kelleher, resigned.
- 13565/15. } Forwarding a copy of the Report of the Auditor  
13<sup>th</sup> March. } on his audit of the Union Accounts for the half-year ended the 30<sup>th</sup> Sept-1914, with attested Abstracts of the Accounts.  
"It appears to me that the Master does not exercise sufficient control over his subordinate officers the allows himself to fall too much under the control of an assistant whom he employs to keep his books. At future audits he should be in a position to explain anything



in connection with his books without having to summon the assistance of his clerk. He explained to me that he had no means at present of checking the work done by the tailor & shoemaker. (There follows a statement of work done by them during the half years ended March & September, 1914, respectively.)

The question for the Guardians to decide is whether these tradesmen give them adequate returns for their wages & also whether the quantity of articles turned out by them is the most that could be made from the material supplied. A book should be kept by the Master showing the numbers of pairs of boots repaired & the leather & other necessaries used in such repairs.

The clerk continues to discharge his duties in a very satisfactory manner.

*The attention of the Master was directed to the observations of the Auditor & he was advised to act as recommended.*

In response to advertisement for a Wardenmaid in the Workhouse, applications were received from Bridget McDonough & Mary Flaherty. *Mary Flaherty was appointed on probation for a period of three months.*

In pursuance of notice given for this date Mr. Bailey moved that the Ambulance Driver, Thomas Kenny, be granted an increase in his wages. The motion was seconded by Mr. Redington. After considerable discussion, several Guardians bearing testimony to the man's sobriety & attention to his duties, which are, at times, of a dangerous, (as in the removal to Hospital of patients suffering from infectious diseases) & disagreeable nature, it was unanimously agreed to increase his wages from 15/- to 18/- a week. *The sanction of the L.S. Board to this increase is earnestly requested.*

The Clerk submitted further correspondence from the "Freeman's Journal" on an account for advertisements in June last, now statute barred, the C<sup>o</sup> persisting in stating that the account was furnished in due time, the Clerk maintaining that it was not received by him, notwithstanding that he wrote for it on 22<sup>nd</sup> Sept. last.
