The Charge Nurse in the Fever Hospital, in reply to the Guardians' inquiry re some clothing of patients missing, stated that she is not responsible for patients' clothes after she sends them out of the Hospital to be disinfected. The Porter in charge of the Disinfecting Chamber probably sent the missing articles home with some other patients' clothes in mistake.

Read Letter from L.G.B. No 17145/15, dated 10th June, 1915,

Adverting to the Minutes of the 24th March last, & requesting to be informed whether the Medicine Contractor has since replaced the inferior balance unfavourably reported upon by the Analyst, by a fresh supply of standard quality.

The Board are referred to an entry in the Minutes of the 21st April last, of a letter received from Messrs. Boyleau & Boyd, Medicine Contractors, in which it is stated that lime water of standard quality in lieu of some unfavourably reported on by the Analyst, was sent with a recent consignment of Medicines.

Dr. S. A. Francis, Medical Officer of the Moycullen Disp. Dist, signed an agreement for the payment of £25 a year as rent for the Dispensary Residence which the Guardians propose to erect for him at Moycullen, to be deducted from his salary in quarterly instalments of £6-5-0.

Dr. J. Loftus, Medical Officer of the Spiddal Disp. Dist, signed an agreement for the payment of £20 a year as rent for the Residence purchased for him by the Guardians, to be deducted from his salary in quarterly instalments of £5, but added a clause that "the rent is to commence when the Engineer certifies the proposed repairs duly completed." This clause was deleted & the following sub-

stituted. Rent to commence from 1st June, 1915, as Dr. Loftus has been in occupation of the House free of rent during the past nine months.

31st May '15, From the Guardians of Abbeyleix Union, stating that they have adopted the resolution of this Board re the Insurrection's Objection Clause in the Vaccination Acts.

The Guardians beg to refer the L.G. Board to the Minutes of the 24th March last containing an entry of the acceptance of a tender for the building of a Dispensary & Medical Officer's Residence for the Moycullen Disp. District, conditionally, that the Board's sanction to a loan of £1000 be obtained.

Also to an entry in the Minutes of the 21st April last, expressing the Guardians' fear that delay might cause a second withdrawal of the tender accepted.

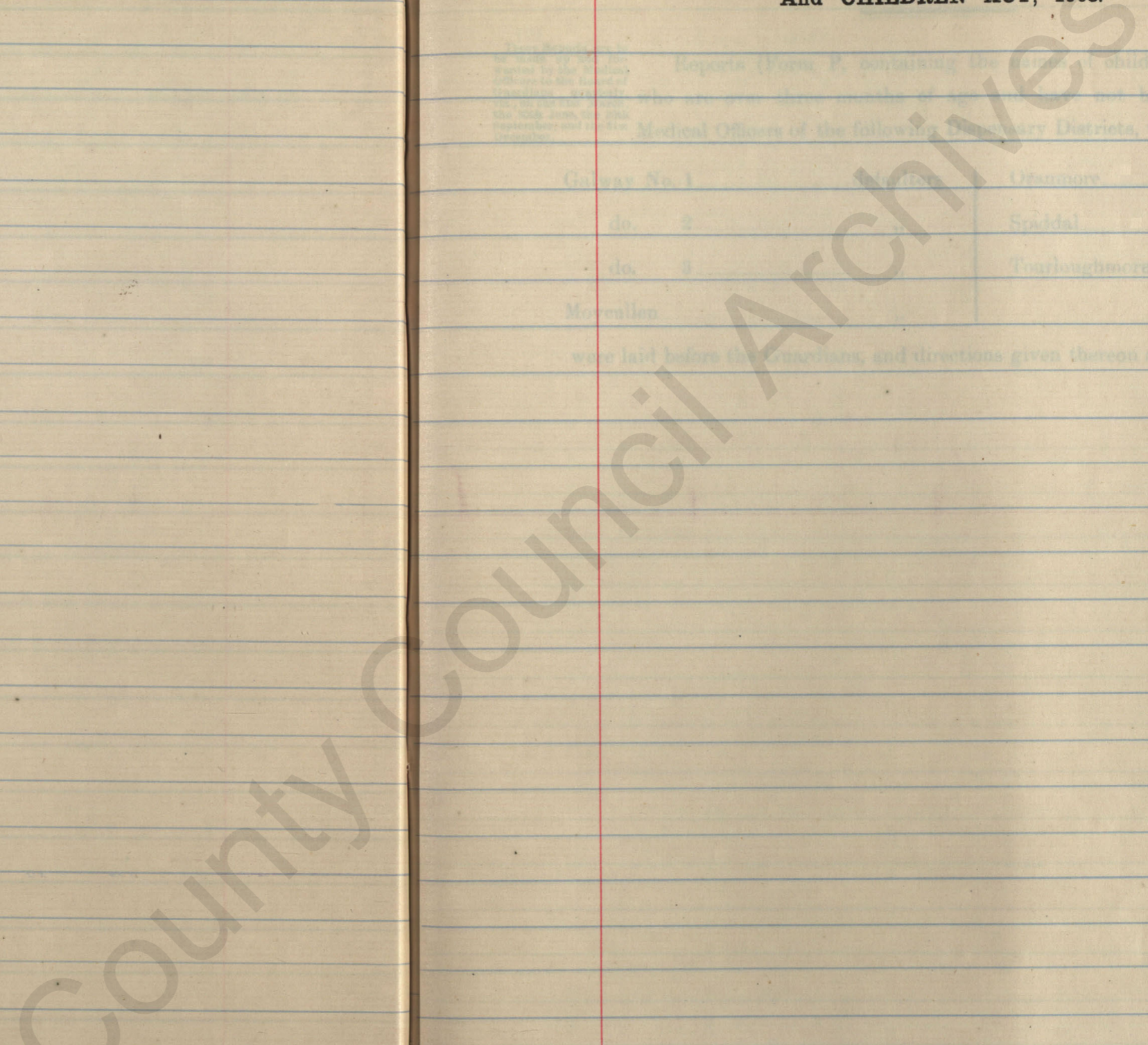
