15th inst. By direction of the Medical Officer I engaged the services of Nurse Rita Kelly of the County Hospital to do duty for Nurse O'Connor who is unwell.

Approved. Remuneration, £1-1-0 a week with rations. The Electric Bells in the Hospital are out of order, I got the electrician to repair them a short time since, but he could not get them to work satisfactorily, the wires being all patched, New wires are needed.

Order. The Master to obtain estimates for the work from local fitters.

Nurses Laffey & O'Connor desire to have their rooms painted.

Moved by Mr. Redington, & seconded by Mr. Pringle, that tenders for the work be invited.

Moved by Mr. Finnan, & seconded by Mr. Lydon, that as the work is so trifling, the Master to arrange for it.

On a division the amendment was carried by 19 votes to 5.

Please appoint a committee to arrange for the sale of pigs in the Workhouse.

The members in attendance were appointed a committee.

On the recommendation of Dr. Waters, Acting Medical Officer, an order was made for the transfer of Mary Kelly, suffering from inflammation of eye, to the County Hospital for operative treatment.

15th Decr. '15, From Mr. P. Flaherty, Relieving Officer for the Aram Islands District, reporting that on the 11th inst. human remains supposed to be one of the victims of the S.S. "Lusitania" disaster, came ashore in a very decomposed state. Another on the following day. When the Police learned from the Coroner that inquests were not necessary, they handed over the remains to him for burial. He got them buried in Kelleamy Burial Ground, not knowing the religious denomination, he arranged for the burial as far away from other graves as possible. He furnished an account of the expenses incurred to the Police who promised to forward it to the Comdant G.

The Parish Priest told him he had no right to inter the remains in consecrated ground, that the Archbishop would be informed of the transaction, & probably exhumation would be ordered. *The Guardians expressed approval of the action taken by the Relieving Officer. They failed to see what else could be done in the circumstances.*

The man has to attend on Sundays as well as week days. The motion having been seconded by Mr. Moloney was carried unanimously.

Board to reconsider their decision in the case of the Workhouse Sailor & Shoemaker, to whom the Guardians at meeting on the 26th ult. voted an increase of 7/- weekly in their wages, respectively. The Board must be aware of the increase in the cost of living owing to war prices for provisions, &c.

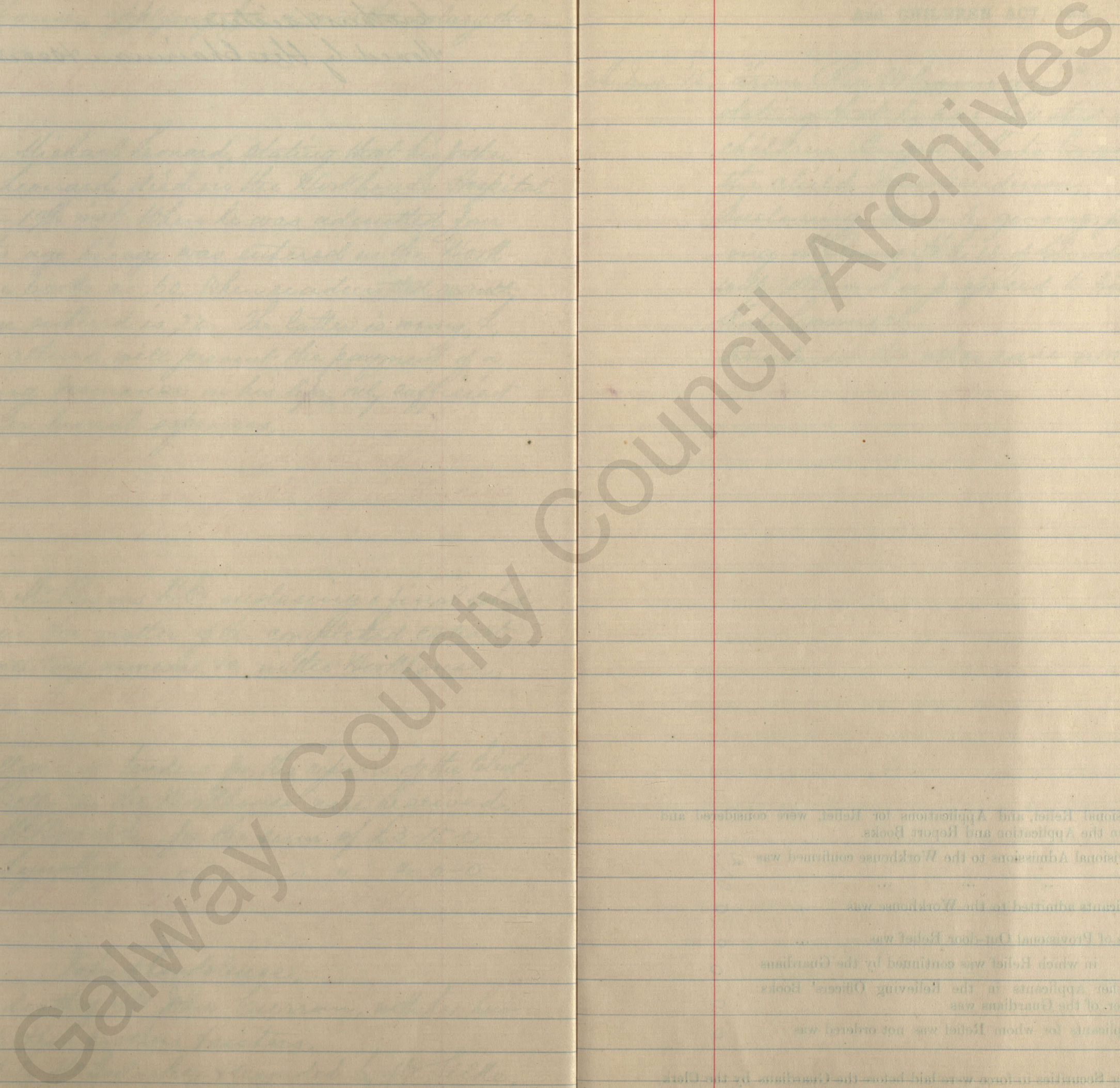
