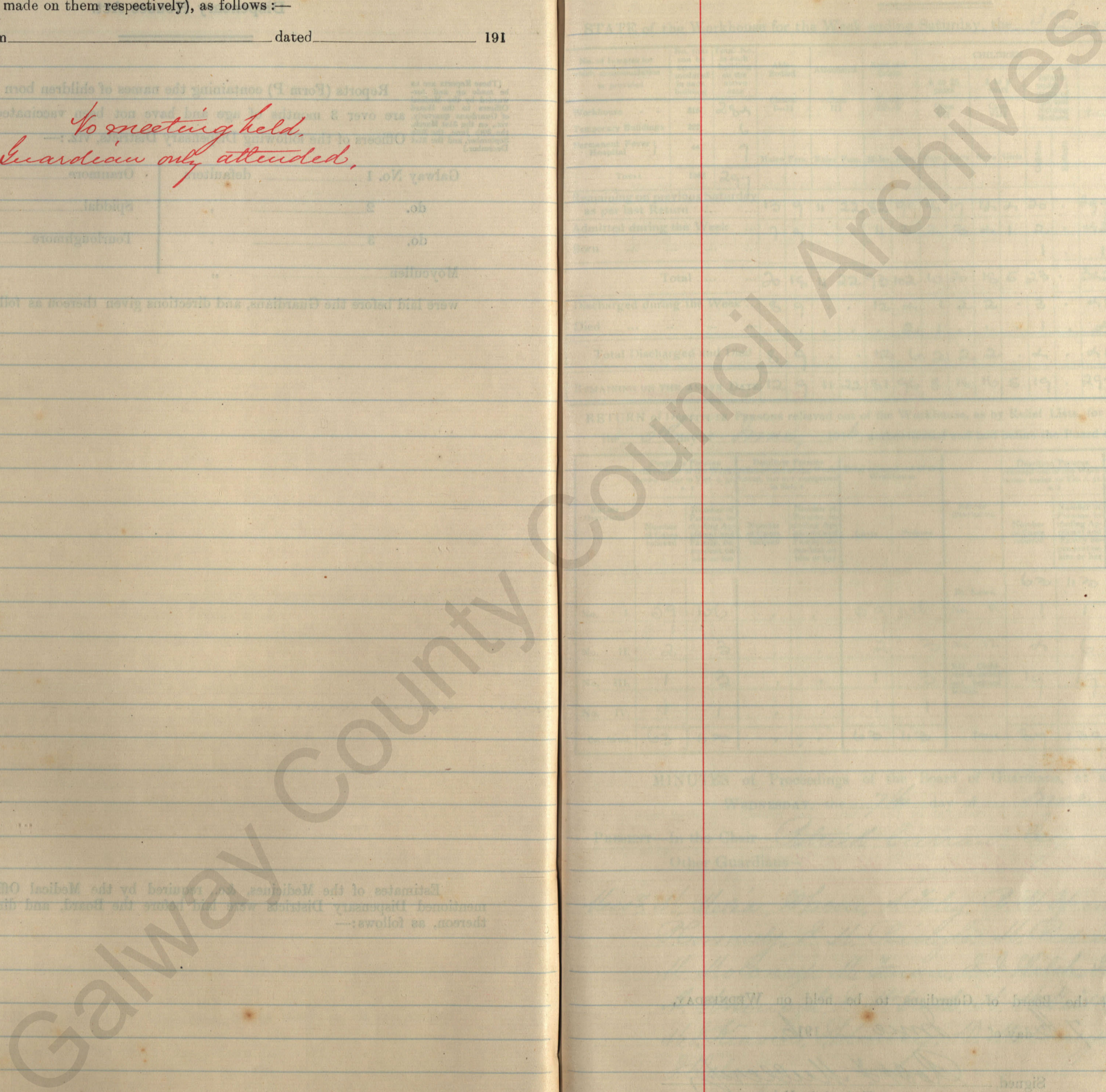

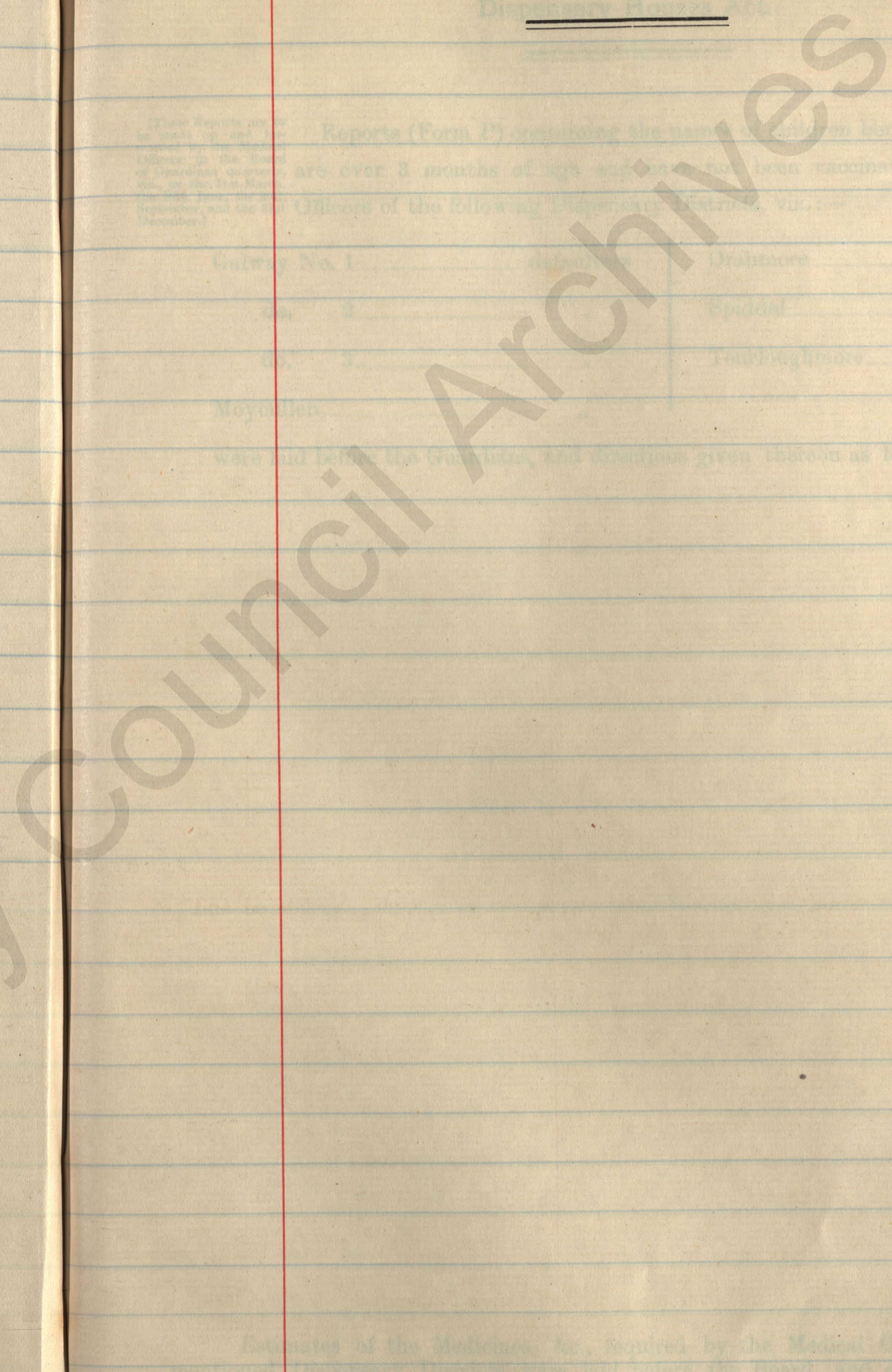

Sanctioning remuneration at the rate of £4.40 a week to Dr. J. J. Waters for his services as temporary substitute for Dr. Francis in his capacity as Medical Officer & Medical Officer of Health of the Moycullen Disp. Dist.

20,947/16.
30th May. } Sanctioning the Guardians' proposal to grant leave of absence to Dr. Francis, Medical Officer of the Moycullen Disp. Dist. to enable him to accept service with the R. A. M. C. during the period of the War, & to pay him an allowance at the rate of £40 a year while so absent.

20,560/16.
30th May. } Acknowledging the receipt of replies to queries respecting Dr. Donogh J. O'Keefe, whom the Guardians have employed as temporary Medical Officer of the Moycullen Disp. Dist. & sanctioning Dr. O'Keefe during the absence of the Medical Officer on service with His Majesty's forces: & stating that in view of the extent of the Moycullen Disp. Dist. the Board have sanctioned Dr. O'Keefe's temporary employment so as to provide the poor of the District with the services of a resident-temporary Medical Officer. The Board, however, think that the Guardians should make further efforts to secure for the District a Doctor who is not eligible for military employment, & afford Dr. O'Keefe, who is eligible, an opportunity of offering his services to the military authorities.

It has failed the Guardians to secure the services of a Doctor who is not eligible for military employment.
