The member of the Ladies Committee who has charge of St. Redmond, a cousin to the foster parent, frequently complained to me that Mrs Pattery habitually overdraws her account, & I know the child wears the cast-off clothing of Mrs Pattery's own child & is seldom well or neatly dressed."*

And CHILDREN ACT, 1908.

10<sup>th</sup> July '16.

From Rev. W. Conway, P.P. Chairman of Committee for Boarded out children in Glencamaddy Dist. <sup>at school</sup> calling attention to the irregular attendance of the children Malachy Carey, Mary K. Gore, Mary O'Brien, James Shannon, & John Feeney, & recommending that the usual fines on the foster parents be inflicted except in the case of John Feeney who refused to go to school. Lately he has been attending, but should he become again insubordinate he should be removed as his foster parent, a spinster, seems to have no control over him.

The foster parent of the child Edw. Blakey is not a suitable person, but his daughter is a respectable young woman. He is a school teacher & I fear the child is often absent from school than is returned in the quarterly Return. Recommending that he be cautioned that unless he alters his conduct the child will be removed from his home. Recommending an annual allowance for school requisites for each child from 1/- to 3/- according to age, to be paid to the school teacher, not to the foster parent.

The maintenance cost has increased considerably & it is a question for the Guardians to decide whether the allowance of 3/- a week for each child be increased. Some of the foster parents have applied for an increased allowance.

Order. The usual fines to be imposed on the foster parents for absence of children from school. The recommendations of W. Conway to be carried out.
