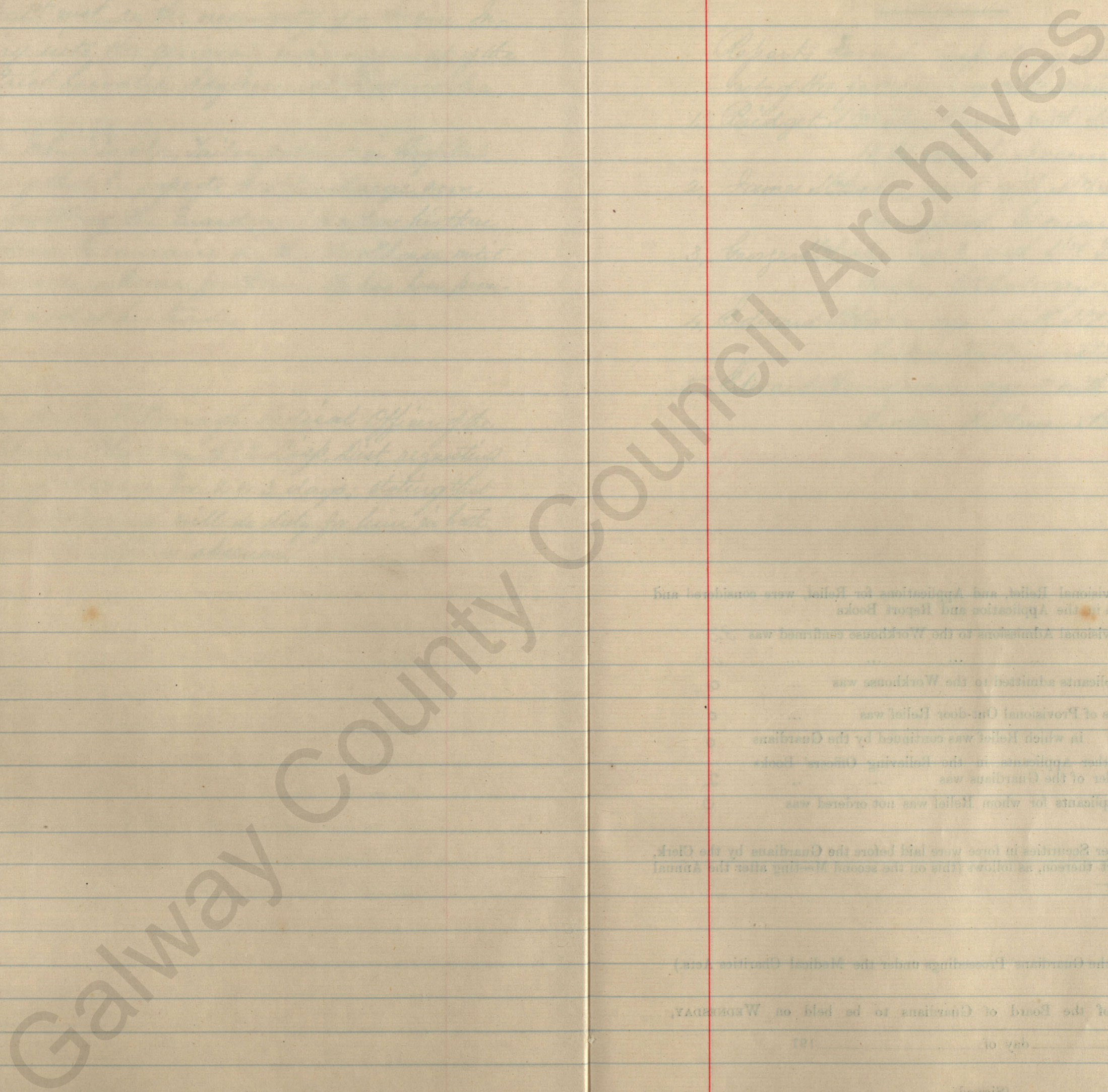

Dr. Loftus's Reply.

Following my letter to you of the 16th inst. I beg to reply as follows, to yours of the 14th inst. No 15053/1916, viz:—

On the 25th February, 1916, I attended Michael Feeney, brother of Coleman & Sarah Feeney, of Letterpeak, who had been, during my absence on leave, attended by a Salway Doctor, on the occasion of this attendance, Coleman,

the brother, said he "could not conveniently pay my fee now, but would do so in a few days," to which I agreed.
