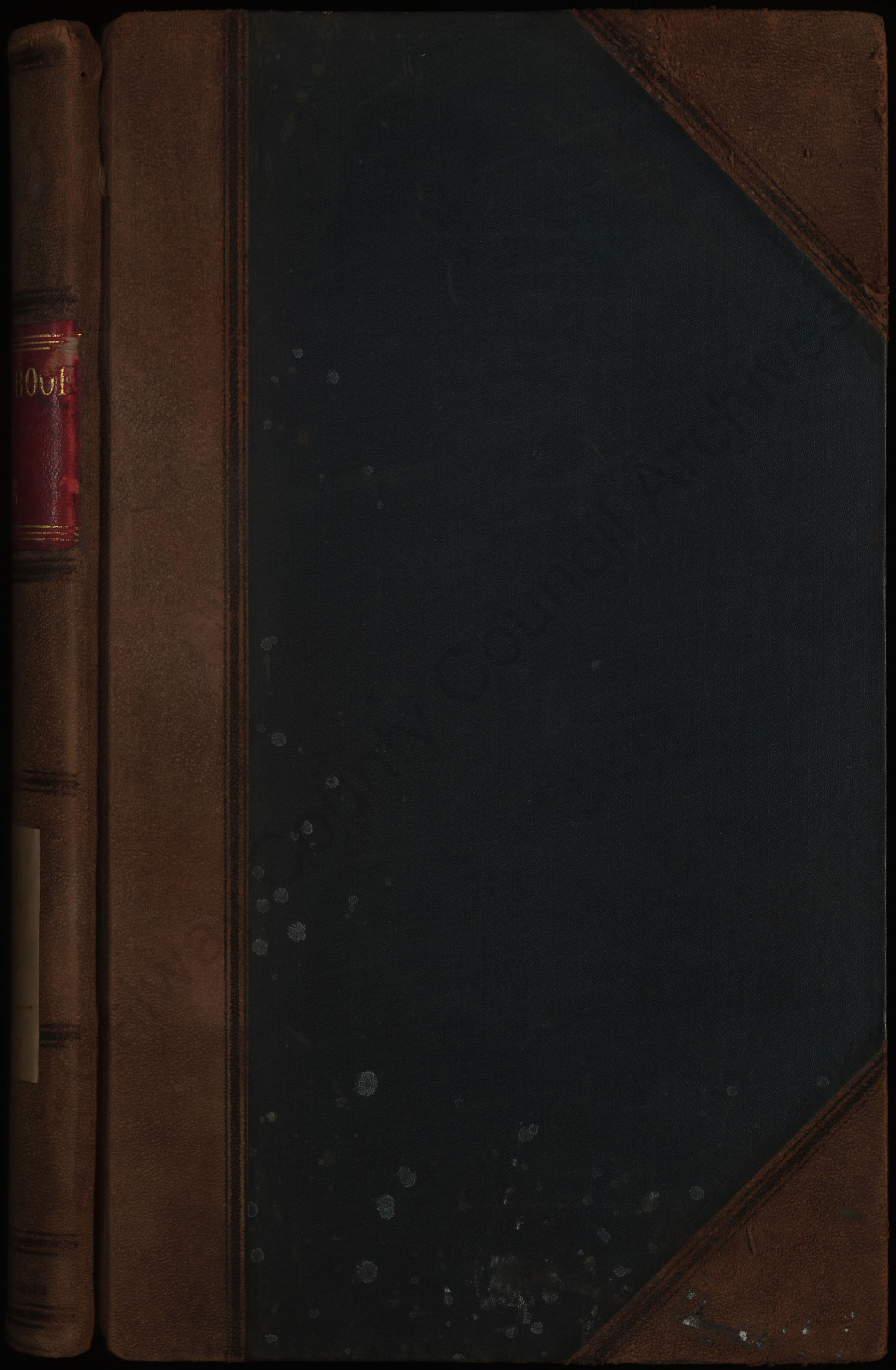

O'Beirne, Nurse in the Fever Hospital, denying that there was any truth in the complaint made to the Guardians by Wardsmaid Annie Hong, that she spoke disparagingly of her to the patients. She never discussed the Wardsmaid with the sick. She complained to the Medical Officer of the conduct of this Wardsmaid on two occasions when she was severely reprimanded, for having interfered with her in the discharge of her duties to patients.

The Presiding Chairman expressed his opinion that this explanation was satisfactory. Messrs. Cooke & Griffin disagreed, & Mr. Murray was in favour of deferring its consideration to a larger meeting of the Board when both Nurse & Wardsmaid could be heard. Consideration deferred.
