Referring to the further entry in the Minutes of the 15th Decr, relative to the proposed payment of a fee of £440 to Dr. Sandys for his services in assisting the Medical Officer of the Spiddal Disp. Dist. at a difficult midwifery case; & pointing out that the Court of King's Bench decided in 1904 in the case of Dr. Flood v the Guardians of Ballyshannon Union, that the special authority given under the Dispensary Rules to the Medical Officer of a Disp. Dist. to employ extra professional assistance did not empower him to bind the Guardians to pay a higher fee than the one prescribed under Article 23, that the Guardians were not liable for a greater fee, & that the medical practitioner requisitioned to render assistance must be taken in law to know of the limitation to the Medical Officer's powers in the matter.

11th Decr '16

From ^{the Hon} Mrs Campbell, referring to the arrangement made by her husband to contribute a sum of £10 annually to the District Nurse in the Moyculleen Disp. Dist. provided the nurse gave satisfaction in every way. As they have ceased to reside at Moyculleen they cannot be certain that the nurse gives satisfaction, indeed she has been informed that the nurse's charges have been increased. In consequence the grant of £10 a year will not be continued, but, instead, the cottage built by Lord Rathedow for the use

of a nurse, will be assigned over to the Board of Guardians if they so desire, on condition that the nurse be allowed to occupy it rent free.

Moved by Mr Little, seconded by Mr Lawless, & unanimously Resolved, that ^{the Hon} Mrs Campbell be informed that the Guardians accept with grateful thanks her kind offer & under the condition named.

11th Decr '16, From Messrs O'Connor & Richardson, whose tender for the building of a Dispensary & Residence for the Moyculleen Disp. Dist. was accepted before the outbreak of war, stating that before their work was stopped they had incurred expense to the amount of £10, cutting foundations, &c. Requesting payment of that amount as the stoppage of the work was out of their doing.

From Mr John Morris, owner of the Dispensary Depot at Annaghdown, in reply to the complaint made to the L.G.B. by Dr. Elym, Medical Officer, to the effect that he had been refused a fire in the Dispensary since March last. Stating that Dr. Elym's charge is wrong & false; that fires are kept in the Dispensary & Waitingroom from 1st Octr to 1st April each year as per agreement, inasmuch as the Waitingroom is also the kitchen of the ^{the} use a fire is always kept lighting therein, that he has been in charge of this Dispensary

during the past 50 years, & never before was a complaint made against him by either an Inspector or Medical Officer.

D. Lynn called at the Dispensary on the 1st Sept last, after 2 o'clock, p.m., when he should be going home. He was in such an excited state he did not need a fire but he ordered it to be lighted at once. I told him my agreement was from 1st Oct, he called me a damned liar, that his orders should be obeyed & not those of the Guardians as he would prove. He kept roaring & following me with his clenched fists & tried to assault me until I escaped. Two persons who were in the waiting room can prove this if required. Any other explanation can be given. The Relieving Officer can tell the Guardians about fires being kept up in this Dispensary.
