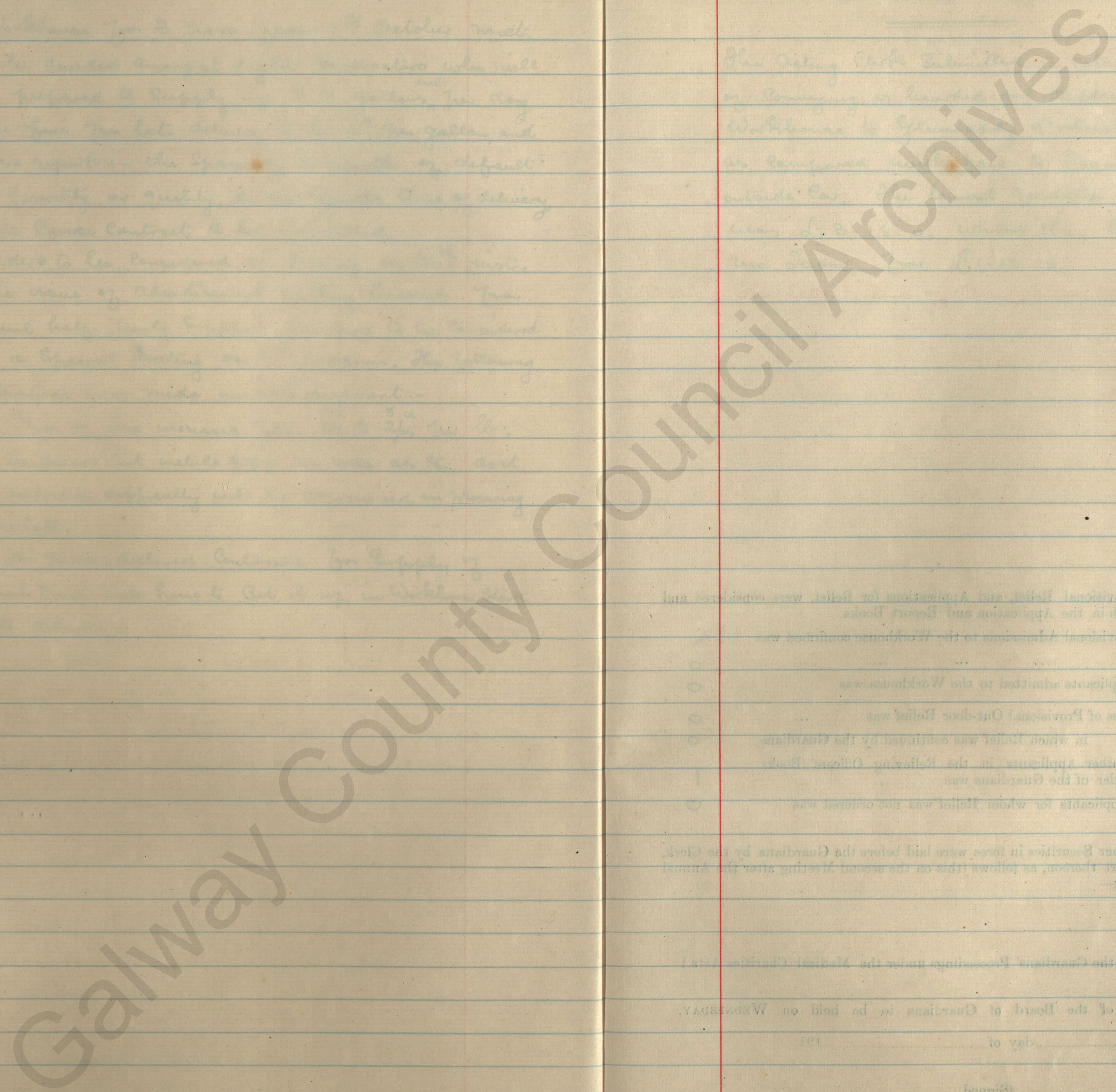

Read Letter from L. G. Board, No. 35,799 dated 9th August, 1916

Stating that they have received the report of their Medical Inspector, Dr. Florence Dillon, relating to the Inquiry on Oath held by her on the 11th ultimo, into the charge preferred by Colman and Nora Feeney, against Dr. Loftus, Medical Officer of the Spiddal Dispensary District, to the effect that he accepted two fees (2/6 and 2/-) from them in respect of his attendance upon their mother, a dispensary patient, on whose behalf his services had been requisitioned upon a Medical Relief Ticket, Form 3².

After reviewing in detail the facts elicited at the Inquiry, the L. G. Board are of opinion that the evidence established the charge put forward, and in view of the warning previously administered, to the effect that should any further well founded complaint be made as to his demanding or accepting fees from persons entitled to Dispensary Medical Relief, he would be removed from his position by an order under Seal, the Board consider that Dr. Loftus has forfeited his right to his appointment, and they have accordingly given instructions for the issue of an order under Seal removing him from office, but they will defer the issue of the order for a week to afford him an opportunity of tendering his resignation. Proposed by Mr. A. Lydon, seconded by Mr. M. J. Cooke, and unanimously.

Resolved - That we respectfully request the L. G. Board not to issue a Sealed Order, dismissing Dr. Loftus from his position as Medical Officer of the Spiddal Dispensary District, but

allow him continue in office on Probation for 6 months, and should any further charge of a similar nature, be proven against him, the Guardians will not raise the slightest objection to his dismissal. If Dr. Loftus' services are now dispensed with, the Guardians are aware it will be impossible to fill the position, entailing great hardship on the poor of the District, the more so, as the Deas outbreak at present raging in the adjoining district of Lettermore, is liable at any moment to spread to Spiddal.

17th instant. Mary Flynn, unmarried and pregnant, a native of Citterswell in the East Union, was conveyed to the Workhouse on a private car, by a man named Michael Hallinan, of the same locality. She was taken to the Lying-in Ward by an inmate attendant before I was consulted. The Maternity Nurse considered the case urgent, and I admitted her as a patient. When Dr. Colohan arrived, he directed me to employ a Special Nurse, as the Maternity Nurse was already in attendance on a serious Sepsis case. I employed Nurse Maher, and Mr. Hallinan agreed to pay all expenses incurred. During the night, the patient gave birth to twins. She alleges that Michael Hallinan who conveyed her to the Workhouse, is the putative father.
