Several of the wire mattresses in the Fever Hospital are worn out quite unfit for use, suggesting that new ones be procured immediately as there are none in reserve. The mattresses now condemned were of poor quality without supporting strands, & unfit for use in a hospital. A good mattress found in the Workhouse Male Infirmary Ward could be taken as a standard.

*Order. The immediate supply, if possible, of six mattresses equal to the standard recommended.*

In pursuance of notice given for this date, Mr. H. Hoole moved the rescission of the resolution of the Guardians limiting the number of milk contractors to eight, & that Mr. James Feeney be taken on as an extra contractor.

Read Letter from *Dr Loftus* dated *17<sup>th</sup> Oct* 1916,

(*Medical Officer of Spiddal Disp. Dist.*)  
reporting that early on the morning of the 16<sup>th</sup> inst. he was presented with a visiting ticket to attend Mrs Bridget Tolau, aged 30, of Cartroulahan for confinement. Finding her condition very serious he considered it imperative on him to obtain medical assistance & wired for Dr Sandys of Galway who promptly attended & gave assistance. With very great difficulty they delivered the patient the case being the hardest he experienced. It would have been impossible for him to complete the case without assistance.

Dr Sandys claims a fee of £5-5-0 for his services.
