I saw the meat in the Workhouse yesterday which came in in several pieces instead of in quarters. The contract is to be supplied in quarters. I spoke to the Master about it & he said the meat would get bad if supplied in quarters. It was supplied in quarters in the late Master's time & it did not get bad because he used to corn any that was over. It is true the present Master knew how to corn meat, being long enough in office.

The reason the meat is contracted for in quarters is that the Officers & inmates should get the same meat.

Also the milk is not supplied in time in the morning which delays the supply of breakfasts to the patients. The degrees of cream are never taken now.

2nd June, '17. From the Clerk of Union, Loughrea, forwarding a copy of a resolution passed by the Guardians of that Union as follows:—
That we strongly disapprove of the proposal in the application to Ireland of the Representation of the People Bill to appoint the Clerk of the Crown & Peace in each County as Registration Officer, & thus hand over the fees for preparing lists of Voters to an Officer appointed by the Crown who is already in

receipt of a good salary. The Overseers referred to in the Bill, should, we maintain, be the Clerks of the Unions who possess, or have the means of obtaining, that local knowledge which is indispensable to the accurate preparation of the lists of Voters.

That our Parliamentary Representatives be requested to have the Bill amended so that Secretaries to County Councils, Officers appointed by the representatives of the people, be appointed Registration Officers & the Clerks of Unions continued as Overseers.

Unanimously adopted.

6th June, '17. From Joseph Theriton, inmate of the Workhouse, stating that he has been granted the Old Age Pension, & he wishes to live outside; that the clothes he brought in many years ago are now so moth eaten as to render them unfit for use.

Mr. R. Macdonald was the only person who tendered for the extension of the Telephone Service from the Workhouse to the lying in Hospital, to provide all necessary fittings, &c. for the sum of £12-5-0. For upkeep for 5 years at the rate of 15% a year.

Mr. P. O'Sullivan, Inspector under the Infant-life Protection Act, submitted a report of

his inspection of 7 children housed in Galway, found all of them clean & healthy.

Clerk's Report.

As directed by the Guardians at meeting on the 23rd ult, I proceeded to Dublin on the 28th ult. to arrange for the purchase of an Ambulance. The Builders in Dublin & neighbourhood who submitted tenders, had no Ambulances in stock but referred me to the Public Bodies supplied by them with Ambulances. I visited Messrs Kynoch's Works at Arklow, & examined the Ambulance which they purchased from the Dublin Wheel & Carriage Co. but being horse drawn too much time was occupied in conveying patients to Dublin, a long distance, it was abandoned, & a Motor Ambulance substituted. I requested the Dispensary Medical Officer at Arklow for ^{the purpose of} his opinion as to the suitability of the horse drawn Ambulance offered for sale at £55. He pronounced it most suitable for a Fever Ambulance & that it was in perfect condition. After a thorough examination & drive in it, I made the purchase on your behalf for the sum of £50, cutting down the price demanded by £5.

Three days were occupied in travelling & interviews. Expenses incurred £4.

The Guardians expressed approval of the purchase & ordered payment of £50 to Messrs Kynoch & £4 to the Clerk for personal expenses.

In the absence of Mr. J. Bailey, who had given notice that he would move that Thomas Kenny, the driver of the Workhouse Ambulances, be granted an increase of wages, Mr. Hooke moved, - that this man's wages be increased from 20/- to 22/- a week, pointing out that he had, when occasion required, to work on Sundays as well as week days. The motion having been seconded by Mr. P. J. Gallagher, was carried unanimously.

Referring to the Minutes of the 23rd ult. relative to the contract for the supply of milk to the Workhouse, & stating that the Guardians are under a misapprehension in supposing that the Board have power to authorise them to pay an increased price to the contractors. There is no authority vested in the Board which would enable them, by concurring in such payments, to relieve the Guardians of any such liability imposed on them by statute. The Auditor would be bound at the audit of the Accounts, to question any such payments made by the Guardians, & if he allowed it, any ratepayer might lodge an appeal against his decision; or, in the alternative, might apply to the Court of King's Bench for a Writ of Certiorari to quash the allowance. As it is evident that it would be to the financial interest of the ratepayers to object to any variation of the terms of a contract which would result in imposing

an extra charge upon them, the Guardians will recognise that they would incur considerable risk in granting an increased price to a contractor unless they were in a position to justify clearly their action in doing so.

As to Ward, I was never asked to go & see him. In a previous letter Morris stated that I charged 5/- for a red ticket. He knows well that it was for a medical certificate to the Insurance Commissioners as I was not Medical Certifier at the time. I attended Haunon at the Royal Hotel & again at Mr C. Kearney's for which I received nothing. So much for the Porter's lying statement. He

was taken at his full value today by the Inspector from the Registrar General. I don't wish to have anything more to say or do with this Porter P.S. - this degnah Dentist Surgeon & Dispenser of Medicine. He tried to take me in some time ago for £40. He is on for a more dangerous game now. I got enough of his class, a man who risks to be a Porter & D.C. at the same time is capable of anything. Of course he risks nothing, he does not even own the house he lives in.
