Read Letter from Mr. P. Burke, dated 18th Sept 1917,

Owner of the Dispensary at Lachagh, reporting that the Notice Board was removed on Sunday night last & no trace of it could be found.

*Order.* A new Notice Board to be procured & fitted up so that it may be taken in at night.

The Analyst furnished a report on samples of drugs received from the Moycullen Disp. Dist.

*The original forwarded to the L. G. Board & a copy to the Medical Officer.*

In pursuance of notice given for this date, Mr. J. Ruane moved that Dr. P. D. Glynn be granted a superannuation allowance in respect of his services as late Medical Officer of the Turloughmore Disp. Dist. the allowance to be fixed at this meeting.

The motion was seconded by Mr. J. Rooney.

An amendment was moved by Mr. W. Lydon, seconded by Mr. P. W. Lee, that the Local Government Board be requested to sanction the re-appointment of Dr. P. D. Glynn on probation for a period of three months at the same salary as was previously paid to him, with a view to saving the heavy charge of £4-4-0 a week to a temporary Medical Officer as at present arranged, that, in the meantime, the motion to grant a superannuation allowance do stand

adjourned for a fortnight to admit of a reply being received from the L. G. Board.

A division was taken on this amendment which resulted in 28 votes being given for, & 7 against it.

Mr. Ruane insisted upon a division being taken on his motion of which he had given due notice.

Strong objection was urged against this course being adopted by the supporters of the amendment who contended that, as the amendment was carried, it nullified, for the present, the original motion.

The Chairman decided upon complying with Mr. Ruane's request, & a division was taken & resulted in 5 votes being recorded for granting Dr. Glynn a superannuation allowance, 9 Guardians declined to vote, & 21 had retired from the Board Room. No further action was taken on the matter.

At that time the Controller had made public that all Baker's War flour was to be sold at 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> per 280 lb. ex mill. On the same date when they submitted their tender to the Guardians the Controller issued another order to Flour Factors in districts where there is no mill making Baker's flour, giving them power to raise the price from 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> to 4<sup>9</sup>/<sub>8</sub> or 5<sup>0</sup>/<sub>8</sub> to cover carriage, &c. In Galway flour for Baker's use must be imported. Under these circumstances they are compelled to raise their contract price from 8<sup>3</sup>/<sub>8</sub> to 8<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub> to cover the extra 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub> or 5<sup>0</sup>/<sub>8</sub> per sack added by the new order issued. Requesting the Guardians to consent to such increase. The Guardians, under the circumstances, consider it would be just & fair to consent to the increase claimed, & request the sanction of the L. S. Board thereto.

In their tender Mess<sup>rs</sup> Griffin Bros quoted the price as "8<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub> per 4 lb. loaf, subject to the Food Controller's regulations."
