Sanctioning the proposal to increase the salary of Thomas Naughton, Wardsman, from £8 to £12 a year.

11,396/18.

27th May.

Adverting to previous correspondence respecting the proposed appointment of Mary Anne Letherstone as Wardsmaid in the Workhouse, & now sanctioning the appointment at a salary of £12 a year, rising to £14 after 6 months' satisfactory service, together with rations.

22,037/18.

27th May.

Referring to the Minutes of the 2nd inst. proposing to fix a graded scale of salaries for the two Medical Officers of the Workhouse, with a maximum of £180 a year to be reached

after 25 years' service, & by triennial increments.

Stating that having regard to the fact that the duties are divided between two Medical Practitioners the proposed rate of payment appears too high. The Board would be prepared to consider favourably a scheme under which the salaries should be fixed to rise, by such increments as may be determined on from £75 to £140 a year, operating retrospectively, under which arrangement Dr Colahan would be at once placed on the maximum, & Dr McDonough would receive the salary to which he would be entitled having regard to the number of increments which would have accrued since his appointment.

Pointing out that if, at any future time, the whole of the duties now discharged by Dr Colahan & McDonough should devolve upon one Medical Officer, a maximum salary of from £180 to £200 a year might reasonably be fixed for the officer in question.
