Dr. Colahan's opinion.

I consider the Guardians' proposal an excel-
lent one, for if at any time it should become
necessary the night nurse could give advice
& assistance to the probationer. I always won-
dered why any nurse should ever seek the
position of night nurse.

To interfere with the duties of the charge nurse
by adding on to them night-duty would, in
my opinion, be impossible & would lead to
many irregularities.

Dr. McDonogh's opinion.

I would suggest that the nurses do day & night
duty alternately as formerly in the old Fever

Hospital, & to be jointly responsible for the
stock in the Hospital. I would not approve
of a probationer nurse having sole charge
of the patients at night, & would not hold
myself responsible for anything occurring
during the time the probationer was on duty.
