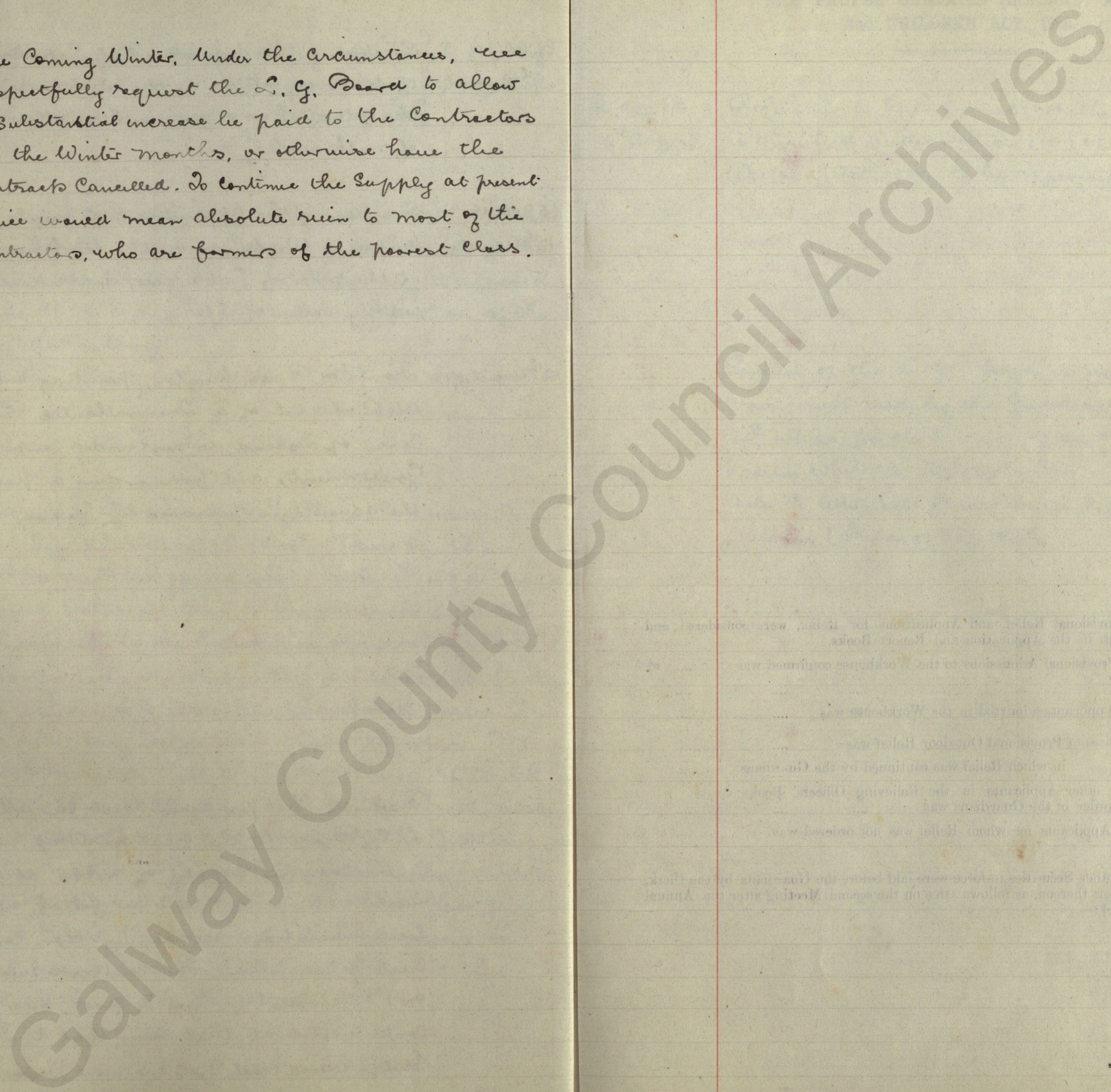

contemplated at that time that the price of feeding
stuffs would reach such enormous proportions, and
apparently they will increase still further in
the*

the coming winter. Under the circumstances, we respectfully request the L. G. Board to allow a substantial increase be paid to the Contractors for the winter months, or otherwise have the contracts cancelled. To continue the supply at present price would mean absolute ruin to most of the Contractors, who are farmers of the poorest class.
