a reasonable price for milk at the present time.
Mrs. Sarah Casserly, a widow with a number of
young children, begged to be released from
her contract as she cannot afford to keep a
sufficient number of cows to enable her to ful-
fil her contract, the fines imposed upon her
in consequence during the past 12 months a-
mounted to a considerable sum.

The Guardians being aware of the difficulties

*this poor woman has to contend with, re-
commend the L. S. Board to sanction the
cancellation of her contract.*

The tender of Mr. P. McLaughlin for the
repairs of the Louvers, &c. at the Workhouse
for the sum of £7-10-0. was accepted.

& tidy, & they evidently receive every care & attention. The beds & bedding are very good & comfortable, & kept in excellent order. The diet appears to give every satisfaction, & no complaints of any kind were received. *The Guardians were very pleased with this satisfactory report.*

5th Sept. '18. From Miss Behan, notifying that the price of coal supplied to the Workhouse, &c. from the pt. inst. will be at the rate of £3-10-0 a ton. *Noted & agreed to.*

7th Sept. '18. From Mess^{rs} Dowdall, Piltahony Co. Cork, stating that the Ministry of Food has substituted a revised specification for Margarine sold in casks, to be retained at $\frac{3}{2}$ per lb. to be charged to the Retailer at $\frac{3}{2}$ per lb. To comply with the specification they are compelled to alter the price Silver lining brand from £4-13-4 to £5-12-0 per cwt.

In pursuance of notice given for this date Mr. N. Lydon moved that the six Relieving Officers be granted War Bonuses of £10 a year each.

After considerable discussion as to amount of Bonus finally it was unanimously Resolved that the War Bonus to each Relieving Officer be £7 a year.

Dr. M. McDonough, Workhouse Medical Officer, & Professors Brereton & O'Malley also attended.

Fagan, & unanimously Resolved, that we recommend that all possible facilities for clinical instruction be afforded in the Workhouse & Fever Hospitals to Medical Students attending the local University College, under the supervision of the Medical Officers of the Workhouse.
