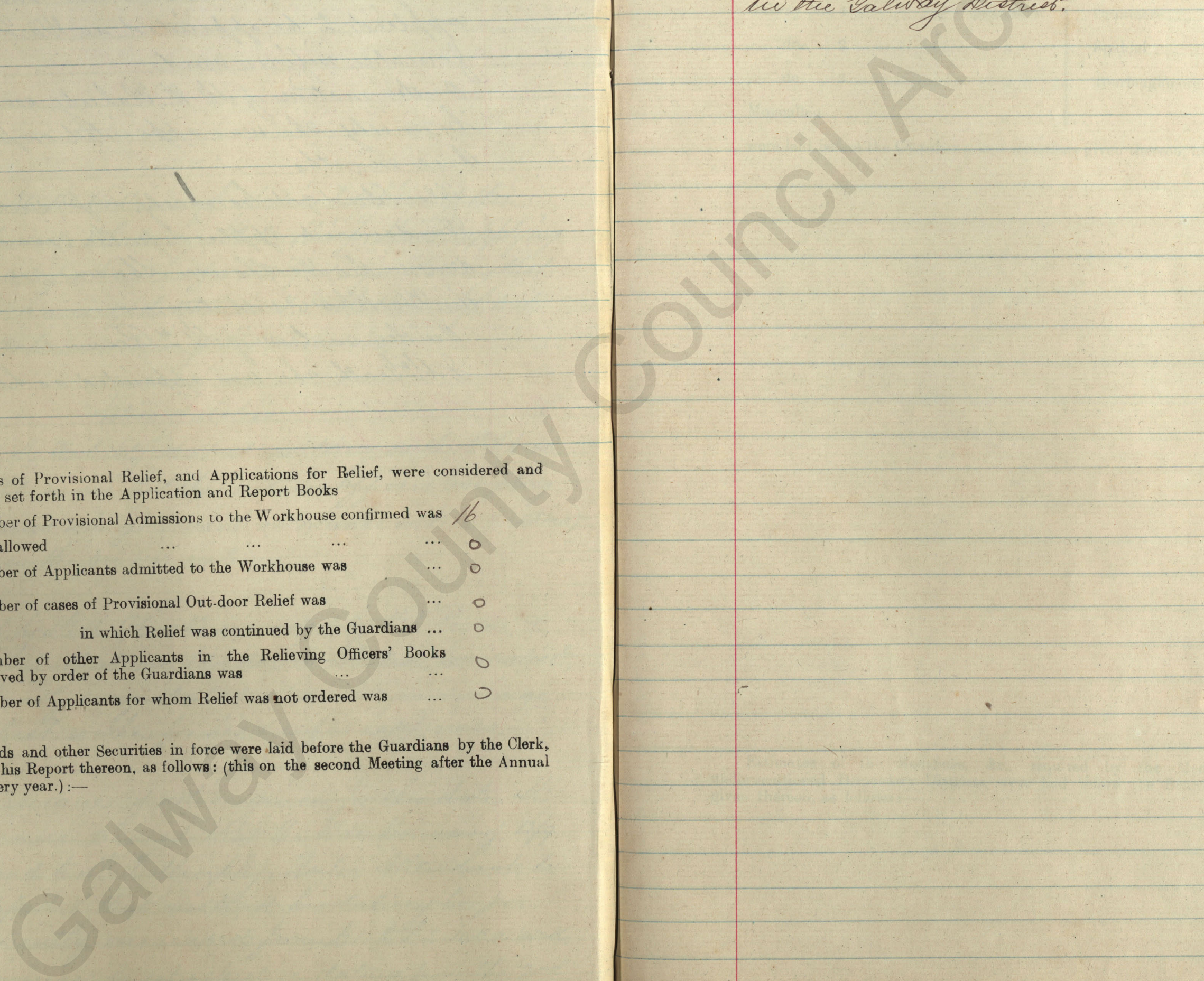

Workhouse Medical Officer.

As there was only one patient, (a war maid) in the Fever Hospital, convalescing after Typhus, & three nurses I considered it my duty, to send the Probationer Nurse back to the County Hospital, as the two permanent Nurses should be able to attend the patient. When Nurse O'Beirne learned that the Probationer's services were being dispensed with she wrote informing me that she had ^{just} done a week's night duty. I wrote a note to Nurse Gore asking her to do night duty pending the decision of the Guardians. I received a written reply from her declining as the Guardians had decided that she was exempt from night duty. She asked me to transfer the patient to the Workhouse Hospital.

but as there were one or two bedridden patients in my Female Ward I considered it would not be fair to add more work to the already overworked nurses there, I declined to order the transfer. She then requested that the patient be transferred to her own (Wardmaid's) room. This I also declined to order. In the old Fever Hospital Nurse O'Beirne did night & day duty in alternate weeks.

I would ask the Guardians to arrange that when there are no patients in the Fever Hospital the two Fever Nurses to do duty in the Workhouse Hospital. Nurse O'Beirne is at present doing night duty. Moved by Mr. N. Hydon, seconded by Mr. W. Flaherty, & Resolved, that the Nurses in the Fever Hospital be informed that they are required to carry out directions as to the discharge of their duties given by the Medical Officers.
