During the half-year the sum of £1.13-4 was paid in excess of the maximum price for Tea, as the amount was refunded before the close of the audit no surcharge was necessary. The Special Diet Books for the Infirmary &

Fever Hospital, the Nursing Mothers' Book & the Medical Weekly Return, are all written up by the Workhouse Porter & signed by the Medical Officers. The Porter informed me that he was paid by the Medical Officers for doing this work. It would appear to be most irregular for the Guardians to allow this practice to continue now that their attention has been called to the matter.

I regret to state that the Master does not keep some of his books written up to date. The milk book is carelessly kept on one side only, the page for reporting the result of his examination on the deficiency in cream being blank for the entire half-year. He informed me that he tested the milk every morning since Mr. Bressford's last visit, - but, as he did not discover any deficiency in cream, he did not bother entering the results of his examination in the proper pages in the milk book. It is an extraordinary state of affairs that since the present Master's appointment, nearly six years ago, there has not been a single report from him as to the quality of the milk delivered at the Workhouse as a result of any examination held by him. The Tobacco Book has not been entered since October 1918. The Master informed me that he kept the necessary particulars on cards but on being asked to produce the cards he admitted that he had not any such cards, that the book was kept by an inmate who was ill & could not be written up until this inmate recovered. In my opinion, the Master delegates

too much of his office work to his assistants, & when it comes to giving an explanation as to matters arising out of his books, he appears to be helpless. At the conclusion of the audit he refunded the sum of £1-15-2, being the value of 95 eggs deficient in his stock for which he failed to account. From the Clerk's Statement of Assets & Liabilities it will be seen that while the Assets amount to £1425-8-2, the Liabilities amount to £2812-12-2.

The Clerk presented his accounts for audit in the usual satisfactory manner. (Of the sum of £1-13-4, £0-18-11 only has been lodged, & up to date £1-16-2 has not been lodged. Clerk.)

As regards the proposal to increase the salary of Wardsmaid Ellen Vaughton, pointing out that as this Wardsmaid has not been five years in office, it would be contrary to the Board's practice to sanction an increase in her case.

stating that the Board cannot see any analogy between the position of Patrick Denis & Thomas Murphy who are permanent Officers & to whom superannuation allowances might be granted under the conditions laid down in the Act 28 Vic. c. 26, & of a dock labourer who has neither a guarantee of constant employment, or the prospect of a pension.

The Board consequently think the demand of these men is unreasonable & should not be conceded by the Guardians.

The Guardians beg to state in reply that if these men resign no persons shall offer their services under ⁴/₁₆ a week each.

3rd Mar. From the Clerk to the County Hospital, stating that the Guardians' request for an amended Demand shall be placed before the Board of Management at meeting on the 15th inst.

4th Mar. From the Clerk of Union, Ballinasloe, forwarding a copy of a resolution of the Guardians of that Union protesting in the most emphatic manner against the cruel & obnoxious treatment of the Irish Prisoners of War confined in English Gaols, & of Corbett a native of this county in Maryboro' Prison.

In response to advertisement Jane Lynskey applied to be appointed as cook, &c. in the Fever Hospital at a salary of £20 a year with rations.

Her appointment was moved by Mr. Curran, seconded by Mr. Griffin, & carried.

In pursuance of notice given for this date Mr. W. Flaherty moved that the salary of Michael Pelly, Workhouse Shoemaker be increased from £1 a week, with ⁴/₁₆ war bonuses, to £2-1-6 a week, permanent. Also that the salary of John

P. Fogarty, Porter in the Fever Hospital, be increased from £1 to £2-1-6 a week. The motions having been seconded by Mr. Griffin were carried unanimously.

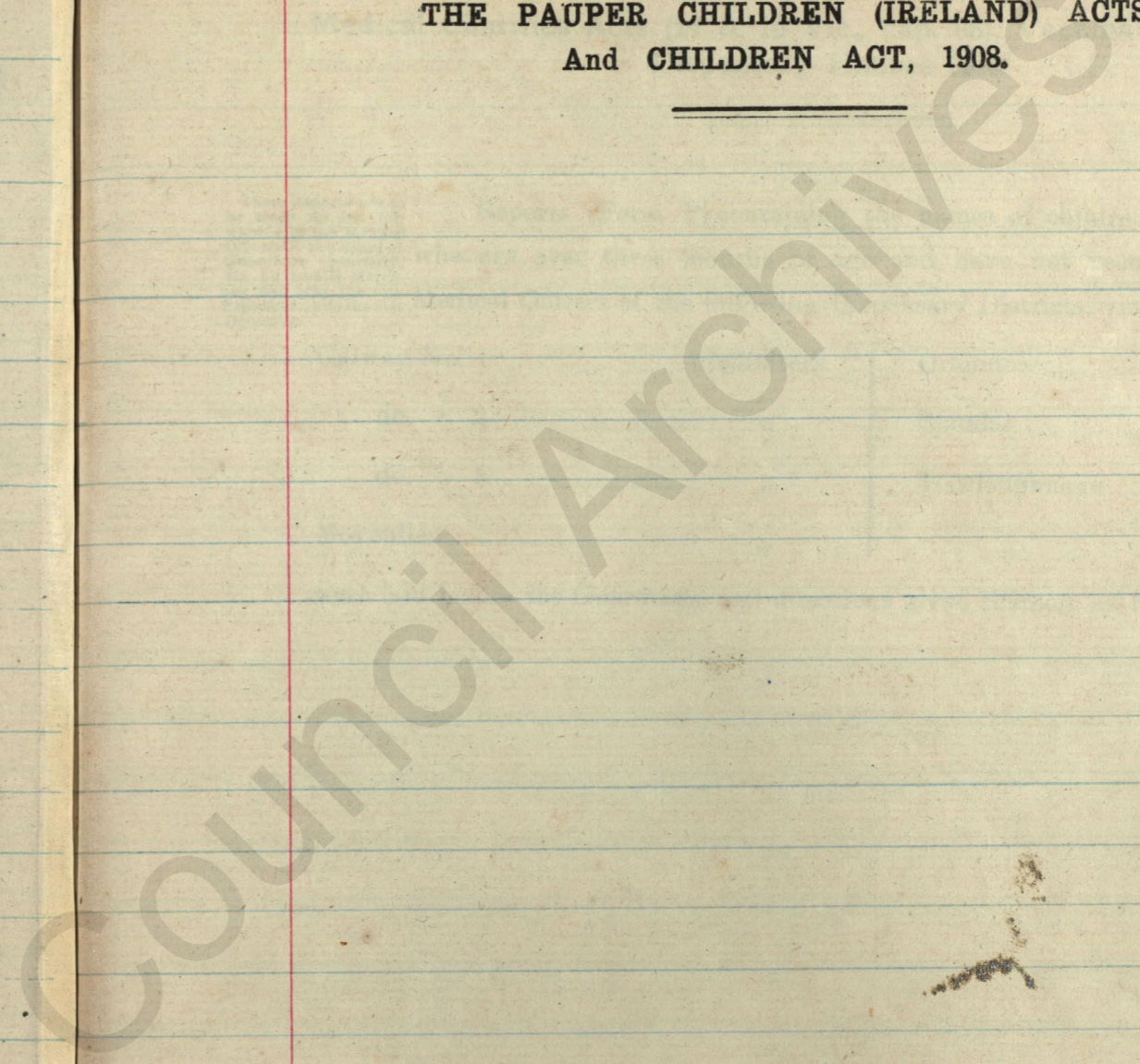
