All officers should get their meat from the one piece, & the meat should come in quarters according to contract.

With reference to Nurse Quinn sleeping at the Nurses' Quarters at the Fever Hospital, no definite opinion, as far as I can see, is possible. The Nurses' Quarters

are isolated from the Hospital, & unless Nurse Quinn visits the Wards—which she should not do—there ought not to be danger of her spreading infection, unless indeed the nurses on duty were capable of infecting her, in which case they would be a danger to the public at large.

At the same time it would be most desirable that the Workhouse nurses should have proper accommodation provided for them. At present there is none.
