Grant amounts paid in augmentation of the salaries of the Workhouse Schoolteachers in respect of the half-year ended 30th ult. & pointing out that the amounts of augmentation for the year are inserted in col. 3 of each form, instead of the percentages of augmentation, viz: 25% in each case.

24th Oct. From the Manager of the Boys' Industrial School, Galway, stating that he had not been officially notified of the increase in charge for the maintenance of the school boys in the Workhouse Hospital.

Resolved, that the old rate only be charged for the maintenance

tenance in Hospital of the schoolboys prior to the 10th inst. when the Guardians raised the tariff.

27th Oct From Rev. P. Davis, requesting the Guardians to fix his salary as Chaplain of the Workhouse at £200 a year. The salary heretofore was £130, but when it was fixed, it was of far more value than the salary now asked. The Workhouse daily Mass & numerous calls from such a large Institution, entails the necessity of an additional Curate in the Parish, hence he thinks anything less than £200 could scarcely sustain him in comfort. Mr. Griffin gave notice that at meeting on the 12th prox. he will move that the salary of the new P. C., Chaplain be fixed at £200 a year.

29th Oct From Miss O'Keine, Nurse in the Fever Hospital, explaining that on the 13th inst. she was informed that a near relation had double Pneumonia. She endeavored to find either the Medical Officer, Master or Assistant Master but they were not available at the time. She made known to the Sister in charge the urgency of the case, she never meant to ignore the Board or the Medical Officer. She begs the Guardians to accept this explanation.

Explanation accepted.

29th Oct From Dr. M. McDonogh, M. D. Medical Officer, on same subject, stating that he had no conversation with Nurse O'Keine but received a message from her to the effect that she had to leave the Fever Hospital suddenly as a relative was seriously ill. A few days later he received another message through Nurse Gore that Nurse O'Keine was willing to pay her substitute. He thought she applied to the Board.

Workhouse Wardsmaids Ellen Higgins & Kate Lorman applied for War Burses as they find that the salaries of £12 a year each insufficient to keep them in clothes.

Moved by Mr. Griffin, seconded by Mr. Maherty, & Resolved, that a War Bonus of £3 a year be granted to each applicant.

Mr. W. N. Rimes, R. C. furnished a specification for the external painting of the Fever Hospital premises, & internal for radiators & Kitchens & pantries. Copy furnished to the L. S. D.

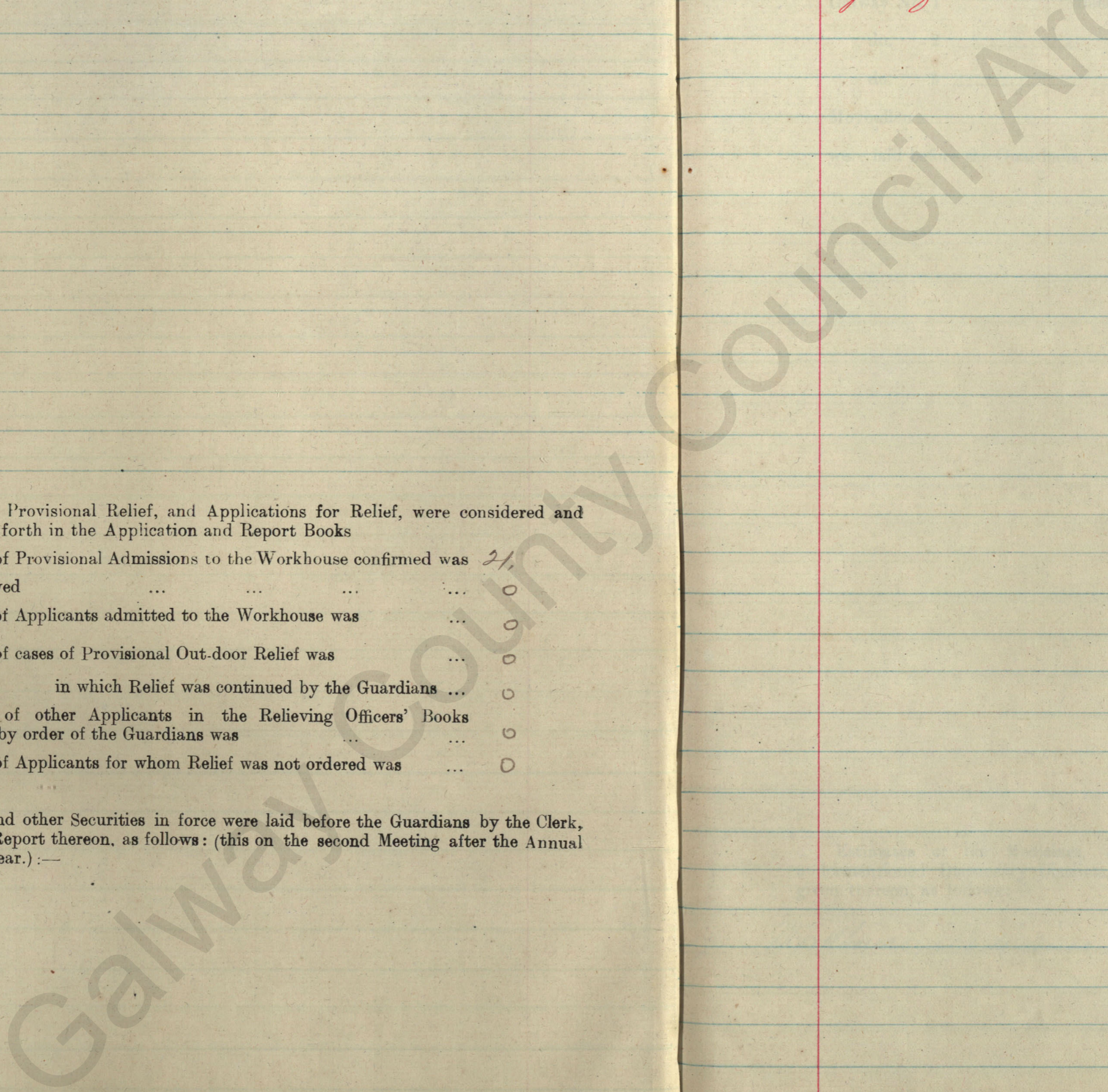
