On the 18<sup>th</sup> June, 1919, the Guardians accepted an offer of 10% allowance on a guarantee of 5 years' continuance, they accept the offer of 15% for the unexpired portion of the 5 years.

7<sup>th</sup> June. From the Irish National Assurance Co, soliciting from the Guardians a transfer to them of the Insurances, as they claim to be the only Irish Co entirely directed & managed by Irish-Icelanders - men & women.
