The weather at present being very inclement, the Guardians await a change before taking energetic measures to enforce compliance with the law.

26th Jan'y. From Dr. Busack, Medical Officer of the Limerickmore Disp. Dist. stating that he has been laid up since the 23rd inst. & was unable to attend at Keshagh Dispensary on 26th inst. He wired to the Relieving Officer his inability to attend. He desires to point out to the Guardians the immediate necessity of providing a Dispensary Residence for the District as he finds it impossible to secure a house or apartments. He would not undertake to carry on his duties from his present residence during another winter.

Recommending that warning be given to Vaccination defaulters that compulsion must be used to make them comply with the law.

Order to be informed that the Guardians will, at the earliest

opportunity, arrange for the provision of a Dispensary Residence.

The Acting Relieving Officer reported the illness of Dr. Busack, but as there were no urgent calls she did not procure the services of a substitute.

3rd Jan'y From the Dept. of Agriculture, re supply of sugar to the Workhouse, a supply of 1 cwt. every four weeks was originally allotted amongst three suppliers, viz: M. J. Hydon, J. Heame & M. Walsh, in view of the increased number of inmates a supplementary allotment of 1 cwt. in every four weeks has been authorised, from M. Hydon & vouchers & authorities have been sent, adding that in consequence of the reduction of the Household ration, the Guardians are only entitled to 75% of the face value of the vouchers deposited with suppliers until further notice.

1st Feb'y. From Mr R. J. Paek Reresford, L. C. Inspector, enclosing sheets taken from books of returns in use in some Workhouses showing the work done & materials used by the Workhouse Tailor & Shoemaker, Approved, & the supply of similar books for use in this Workhouse was ordered.
