- 14th .. Elizabeth Canoll gave birth to an illegitimate child in the lying-in Hospital. She states the putative father to be Wm Rea a soldier. *No order*
- " " Annie Long, Wardsmaid in the Fever Hospital, resumed duty after leave of absence.

13th June '21. From Dr. Mahon of the County Hospital, in reply to an inquiry of the Guardians, ^{stating} that Mr. Mary A. Conroy is not likely to be fit for discharge from the County Hospital for about another month.

Allowed another month.

18th June '21. From the Clerk of Inam Union, stating that the Guardians of that Union have received notice from the Military that it is proposed to take over the remaining portion of Inam Workhouse at an early date.

The Inam Guardians request to be informed whether the Galway Guardians will agree to take over some of the inmates of the Inam Workhouse. There are about 100 in the body of the House & 60 in Hospitals. *No. as it is expected that Galway Workhouse shall be commandeered.*

20th June '21. From the Sec. to the Galway County Council, stating that the Council at meeting on the 18th inst. adopted a report of the County Conference held on 19th March last. A to the effect that the number of Unions in this County be reduced from 10 to 3, as follows:—

- C. That the Hospitals at Blijden & Ballinasloe be retained as District Hospitals.
