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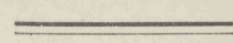

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon as follows:—

- 22nd Oct. Mr. Moffett, V.S. examined the Workhouse horse & gave instructions not to send him on long journeys for a week or so. I am acting up to this advice.
- 23rd " Engaged a horse to bring the ambulance to Clancumrrie to convey 3 ^{inmates} patients to ^{disinfect} the dwellings of persons brought to the Fever Hospital, & to bring clothing in for disinfection. Cost £2-10-0.
- Also a motor cart to convey a patient from Rockbarton to the Springin Hospital at a cost of 3/-
- Approved.*
- 24th " The driver of the ambulance died. An inmate is acting as driver for the present.
- 28th " Mary Solding with her illegitimate child 1 day old were admitted to the Springin Hospital, she states that the patient's father is Wm. Campbell an ex soldier.

Clerk's Report.

- 30th Oct. The Col. Commandant of the Galway Brigade called at the Board Room, to give me notice that on the 7th prox. the Workhouse buildings & premises are to be taken possession of under the Defence of the Realm Act for the accommodation of military. The Workhouse Hospital & Chapel are to be excluded.
- He suggested the desirability of summoning a special meeting of the Board of Guardians to make arrangement for the transfer of the buildings. Also to make application

to the Boards of Guardians of the Doughtyward & Fort-Neuins to receive into their Workhouses some of the inmates of the Galway Workhouse.

The present address of the Chairman of the Galway Board of Guardians being unknown the Clerk was unable to consult with him, & so took upon himself the responsibility of summoning a special meeting for noon on the 2nd prox.

The following members attended in the Board Room at the appointed time, viz. = Mr. Edith Young, & Messrs. Martin Hoole & William Flaherty. As some of the Chairmen were in attendance, the Clerk suggested that a temporary Chairman be appointed. This suggestion was not acted upon.

The Clerk explained the intentions of the Military Authorities to commandeer the Workhouse buildings, & to occupy them on the 7th inst.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively), as follows:—

The members in attendance with the exception of Mr. Flaherty who left after a short time, expressed strong disapproval of the proposal of the Military Authorities to evict the inmates from the Workhouse, & stated that they would not give any assistance whatsoever to the Military.

Fortnightly meeting held on 6th Decy 1921.

The four members in attendance, Mr. Edith Young, & Messrs. Martin Hoole, John J. Walsh & Patrick Cairns, expressed disapproval of the proposed eviction of poor persons who, through dire necessity were compelled to take shelter in the Workhouse, & stated that they

would not take part in the election.
The Clerk inquired of the Oughterard Port Guardians whether they can accommodate some of the Galway Workhouse inmates & received replies that the applications shall be considered at next meeting of these Boards.

Ordinary Business.

23rd June, Claim from the Customs & Excise Authorities, for refunds of Guardians' deductions from Old Age Pensions paid to Miss Thornton 10/- & Margaret Beattie 7/6.
Refused.

6th July - From the widow of the late Ambulance Driver begging of the Guardians to make her a grant of some kind. Her husband contracted fever through the conveyance of Fever Patients to Hospital.
The Guardians regret their inability to make her a grant.

6th July From Miss Benignus, Head Nurse in the Workhouse, requesting 6 weeks' leave of absence, & stating that Miss Francis will act as substitute.
Granted.

6th July From Miss A. O'Brien, Hospital Nurse, requesting 4 weeks' holidays.
Granted when arrangement can be made for the employment of a substitute.

The Clerk called attention to the fact that the month's notice of intention to resign the post of Porter in the Fever Hospital, expires today.
Consideration deferred.

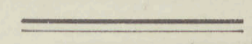

23rd June, from *Mr. Cox*, *Midwife* of the Galway 142 Disp. Dist., in explanation of the charge brought against her of having attended private cases while on sick leave of absence. She attended one case only, which was of a very urgent nature.

Explanation accepted as satisfactory.

16th July Relieving Officer *O. O'Keefe* of the Spiddal Disp. Dist., reported that *Dr. Eubridy*, temporary Medical Officer, did not attend Spiddal Dispensary on the *28th inst.*, because a bridge at *Castello* was ^{blown} up. He could not get his motor across. He has now got a motor bicycle & will be able to attend in future.
