on same day & same hours. When Costello Bridge
was blown up he hired cars & did all the work as before
with the exception of Spiddal Dispensary which
he could not possibly attend before 4 o'clock.
He should have resigned only the Relieving
Officer told him he had made every effort to
obtain the services of another Dr but failed.
