11<sup>th</sup> Feby, D. Waters ceased acting as Substitute for D. M. McDonagh, and was re-placed by D. J. McDonagh.
- 18<sup>th</sup> " " Nurse Leonard who was acting as substitute for Nurse Quinn, left.
- 21<sup>st</sup> " " Mr. Fogarty, Fever Hospital Porter, submitted a Medical Certificate that he will be unable to do duty for at least a fortnight.
- 22<sup>nd</sup> " " Nurse Quinn resumed duty after illness.
- 27<sup>th</sup> " " Dr. M. McDonagh resumed duty after vacation.
- The following old age Pensioners have refused to contribute  $\frac{5}{16}$  p. per week towards cost of maintenance in Hospital:—  
Patrick Chapman, Bartly Spelman & John Kelly.
- The members in attendance, acting as a Visiting Committee, went through the Hospital wards, saw the persons referred to, and warned them that unless they contributed  $\frac{5}{16}$  weekly, the Medical Officers would have them transferred to Infirmary ward of the Workhouse. They also directed the Master to call upon the friends of certain patients, for a contribution towards cost of maintenance.
- Order. A further meeting of the Visiting Committee to be summoned on 9<sup>th</sup> inst. at 11 o'clock.

The Workhouse Master submitted signed written statements from the several mothers of illegitimate children in the Workhouse, giving the names of the putative fathers of their children, and he was directed to submit particulars to the Board's Solicitors with a view to the necessary steps being taken to recover cost of maintenance.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively), as follows:—

- 13<sup>th</sup> February. From the Treasurer, stating that unless funds were placed to the credit of the Guardians, he will be compelled to return Paying Orders already issued. The Acting Clerk reported that the matter had now been set right, an instalment having been received from County Council.
- 18<sup>th</sup> February. From the Secretary of the County Council, stating that Guardians demand of £26710s for ensuing financial year, would be paid in full. The Finance Committee have been authorised, if considered necessary, to make an advance on account of this sum, and will consider applications

at Meeting on 26<sup>th</sup> instant

The Acting Clerk reported having applied on behalf of the Guardians for an advance of £6,000

28<sup>th</sup> Feb<sup>y</sup>. From Same, stating that only 2 members attended Finance Committee Meeting on 26<sup>th</sup> instant, consequently nothing could be done with reference to Union Finance. It was his (Secretary's) intention, to recommend an immediate transfer of £3600, and a further transfer of £2881 on 10<sup>th</sup> April, with a like sum at the expiration of every subsequent six weeks. The matter will be before the Committee on 5<sup>th</sup> proximo, provided a quorum is present. The Guardians would be quite satisfied with this arrangement.

28<sup>th</sup> Feb<sup>y</sup>. From Messrs. McDonagh & Boland, Ltd., Insurance Brokers, requesting the Guardians Insurance business. As already informed, the Hibernian Co. have an agreement for a certain number of years.

From Mr. Patrick Farrell of Carranderry, Foster-parent of George & Edward McEale, complaining of delay in paying for their quarter's maintenance. Inquiring what he is to do as regards further medical treatment of George's eyes. The Acting Clerk reported having replied on 19<sup>th</sup> ult. that quarter's maintenance allowance had been sent to Chairman of Boarding-out Committee on that date. Dr. English of Castlereagh who has had the boy George under his care, has been again written to for instructions.

Mr. P. O'Sullivan, Inspector under the I. L. O. Act furnished a report on children at nurse in his District, from which it appears they are all healthy looking and clean. One woman in Munster Lane has charge of 4 such children. The Guardians are of opinion that 4 children are too many for any one person to take charge of, but in view of Inspector's report, no action was taken.

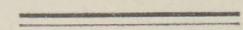

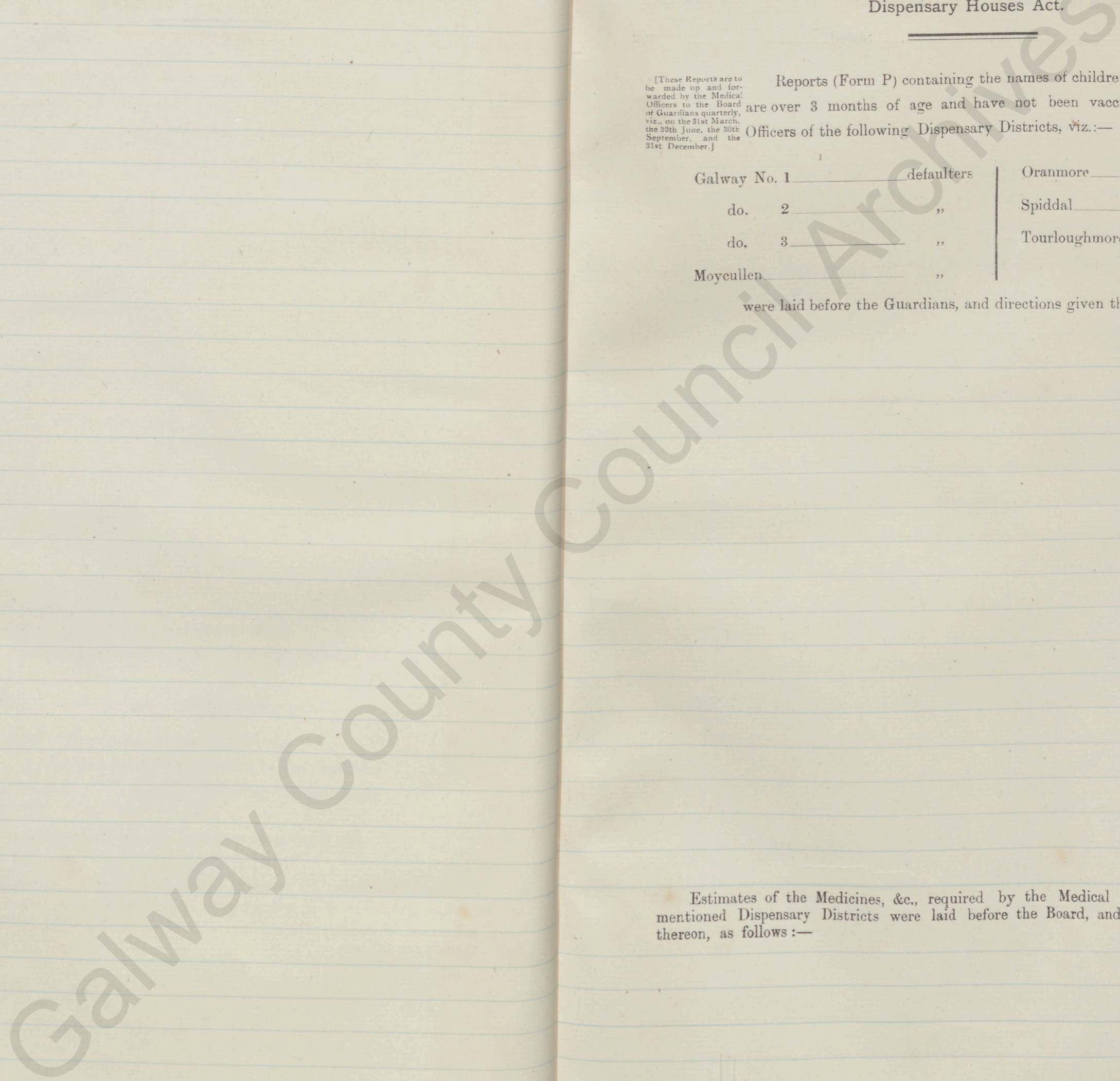
