A Circular Letter dated 15/2/21 from the British L.G. Board was submitted but not read.

Lin. 37/21 From L.G. Dept. of Dail Eireann, requesting to be furnished with detailed particulars, re expenditure and statistics in connection with the Union.

Order. Information asked for, to be furnished.

1787/21 From Same, sanctioning payment of remuneration at the rate of £2.2.0 per week and 1/9<sup>d</sup> in lieu of rations to Miss Sarah Hamilton for her services as temporary nurse in the Workhouse Hospital with reference to the resignation of Wardsmaid Keedy, pointing out that in view of the contemplated scheme



of Union Amalgamation, the appointment of a temporary successor should meet the case.

The Ministry observe from the Minutes that Miss Cullinan (Mrs. Cooney) Relieving Officer, and the Clerk of the Union have been absent from duty on account of illness for a prolonged period, and the Dept. consider that the rules regarding Sick leave adopted for Dispensary Medical Officers should be applied to the other Union Officers, and that no Officer should be allowed Sick leave on full Salary for a greater period than six months. Inquiring whether there is any prospect of the Officers mentioned being able to resume duty at an early date.

The Clerk of the Union wrote pointing out that, as already explained, his long confinement of five months in bed, caused his muscles to go clean out of order, thereby depriving him of the use of his arms and legs. Power is gradually being restored, and he hopes to be able to resume duty within a month.

R.O. Cooney reported that she hopes to be able to resume duty next month. She only expects six months Sick leave on full pay, and six on half-pay.

Order The Clerk of the Union to be placed on half-pay as from 7<sup>th</sup> instant, when his six months expired, and R.O. Cooney to be similarly dealt with as from the 31<sup>st</sup> inst, when her six months will expire.
