From Abetrian Insurance Co., stating they will have pleasure in allowing 15% discount off Fire Insurance Premiums, if the Guardians will continue the business with them for a period of 5 years and pay premium annually in advance. *The Guardians are not prepared to enter any such agreement at present.*

19th March. From Messrs. McDonogh & Boland, Insurance Brokers, stating that if given the Fire Insurance business, it is their intention to continue with the Abetrian Co. as usual, in view of the five years' agreement. *Order.* Payment to be made through Messrs. McDonogh & Boland in future, provided it does not affect local agent.

23rd March. From the Secretary, Galway ^{County} Council, stating that at Meeting of County Conference on 17th instant, it was decided to report to the County Council recommending that the number of Unions in the County be reduced from ten to three, as follows: -

Galway Union, to include Galway, Oughterard & Clifden.
 Inam Union, to include Inam, Glencaddy & Mountbellion.

Loughrea Union, to include Loughrea, Gort, Potanna & Ballinasloe.
 The Hospitals to be retained at Clifden & Ballinasloe.
 That Galway and Roscommon County Councils appoint a representative each, to reside for 3 months at Ballinasloe, and supervise working of Lunatic Asylum, with such powers as the Councils may see fit to give them.
 Boards of Guardians to furnish lists of their Officers, showing Salaries, tenure, length of Service and Conditions in regard to Superannuation, also that such Boards be asked not to make any permanent appointments for the present, and, in view of falling prices, not to enter into contracts for supplies for prolonged periods.

Order. Recommendations approved of.

Acting on recommendation of the Visiting Committee, the Guardians directed that arrangements be made to have all ^{Consumptive} patients at present in Hospitals, or who may be admitted in future, accommodated in No. 2 Infirmary wards on both sides of the Workhouse.
