26<sup>th</sup> Apr. 21, From Nail Bireann Dept. L. S. Dept. forwarding 5 copies of a report from the Commissioners appointed by the Local Board of Guardians to examine the affairs of the Union with a view to effecting economies & remedying certain abuses that had crept in during the regime of their predecessors in office.  
This report is worthy of very serious study by all members of Boards of Guardians in Ireland. It is not suggested that in the case of the smaller Unions it would be an economic proposition to appoint paid temporary Commissioners as has been done in both, but in this Interim Report there will be found clearly set out a statement of

abuses that are likely to creep into any such institution, & of the steps best calculated to remedy them.

This Dept. holds very strongly that it should be the aim of those who are entrusted with the responsibility of local administration of each County to work towards the complete abolition of these institutions as at present administered through amalgamation on a large scale, & that the care of the very poor & the infirm should be ultimately be administered under the direct supervision of the County Councils in Central Homes & County Hospitals.

In the meantime members of Boards of Guardians who take a keen interest in the duties which they understand when standing for election to their respective Boards will derive much useful information from a study of this Report.

7<sup>th</sup> May } observe that the Guardians allowed Mr. Cobb & Mullery to resume duty as Clerk of the Union although they had received a letter from the Dept. dated 22<sup>nd</sup> inst. directing them to place Mr. Mullery on Superannuation as from the 7<sup>th</sup> March.

The Guardians give as their reason for the action taken by them that Mr. Mullery is qualified to discharge the duties, & that it would be unfair to superannuate him when he is able & willing to continue in office.

The Ministry would point out that this Official had been on sick leave from the 7<sup>th</sup> August last, during which time he had been five weeks confined to bed, suffering from an affection of the muscles & consequent loss of use of

arms & legs, & the Ministry are not satisfied that a man of his age (he is now over 70 years) could recover sufficiently from an illness of this nature to be able to discharge the duties of the responsible office of Clerk with efficiency. Besides it is a decided hardship on a man of his years & feeble health to require him to remain in office & continue the onerous duties of this post, - when there is provision in the regulations for his superannuation.

The Ministry must therefore direct the Guardians again to place Mr. Mullery on Superannuation & to take immediate steps to appoint a successor.

Order, Mr. Mullery to submit a medical certificate of his complete recovery from his recent illness.

The Guardians beg to reiterate their statement at meeting on the 2<sup>nd</sup> inst. that Mr. Mullery is capable of discharging his duties in an efficient manner, that they do not require him to remain in office but it is his own earnest desire to be allowed to do so.

Regarding the application of the Inspector of Taxes at Galway for returns of Officials salaries, the Ministry wish to state that under no circumstances should those returns be furnished.
