Medical Officer of the Galway No. 3 Disp. Dist., with regard to the charge of neglect of duty preferred against him in the case of Honoria Burke, and stating that they do not think that an inquiry on oath is necessary in the case, as the Medical Officer offers an explanation, which, so far as the Board can judge from the facts before them, appears to be reasonable.
