20th May, '90. From the Commissioner of Valuation enclosing the Abstract of the Valuation of the several Electoral Divisions comprised in the Union, to correspond with the Revision as completed for the present year.

14th May, '90. From the Right Rev. J. O'Sullivan, tendering to the Guardians his resignation of the office of Protestant Chaplain of the Workhouse on his elevation to the Bishopric of Tuam, and expressing his thankfulness for the courtesy and consideration he has for many years received from the Board. The Clerk stated he would intimate to his Lordship that it will be necessary to forward his resignation to the Local Government Board and at the same time

time name the Clergyman to succeed him in Galway.

21st May, '90. From the Secretary to the Galway Gaslight Co., on behalf of his Directors, requesting permission to erect a lamp bracket on the boundary wall of the Workhouse.

Permission granted.

The Chairman of the Board being unable to attend the meeting, forwarded addressed to the Presiding Chairman, the Engineer's estimate of cost of the proposed alterations so as to cut off communication between the Lying-in Hospital Wards and the Galway Dispensary.

The tender for the work received on the 14th instant and held over till today was then opened by the Presiding Chairman, and being far in excess of the Engineer's estimate was not accepted.

Resolved - That the members of the Visiting Committee, with Messrs. L. O. Burke and T. Mooney, confer with the Engineer with the view to a reduction of his estimate and specification.
