Members present: Capt. M. L. Coleman and Michael Faherty. Also present Dr. Browne, L. G. Inspector. Application from the Medical Officer for an increase of his salary at the rate of £30 a year, read and considered. The application was supported by a memorial signed by the Parish Priests of the District and some hundreds of the Ratepayers, a deputation of the latter attended in support of the memorial to the number of twenty and testified to the unanimous approval of the Ratepayers for the increase.

Proposed by Michael Faherty and seconded by Capt. L. Coleman - That the salary of the Medical Officer be increased by thirty pounds a year. Carried unanimously.

D. Browne, L. G. Inspector, said he was pleased to find a meeting of the Committee and took the opportunity to draw their attention to the Cartroulahan Dispensary. He complained that the press was totally inadequate for the custody of the medicines, and stated that the L. G. B. Regulations required that a separate apartment should be provided for the sole use of the Medical Officer in whose custody the Key of same should be deposited, and urged upon the Committee the necessity of taking immediate steps in the matter. The Dispensary Keeper to be also bound to provide waiting accommodation for the patients.
