No. 21124/90. 31<sup>st</sup> May. Informing the Guardians that they have accepted the resignation of the Protestant Chaplain of the Workhouse, and requesting that they may be informed of the name of his successor in the Parish in which the Workhouse is situated, when such appointment shall have been made.

On the motion of Mr. A. Scott, seconded by Mr. M. Fallon, it was unanimously Resolved—We beg to urge on the Treasury the vital necessity of quickly granting railway communication between Clifden and Galway. Hitherto we had some differences of opinion as to the best route; we are convinced however that the importance of opening Connemara by

by railway communication between Galway and Clifden far outweighs the question of the direction of the railroad, and we willingly accept on this head the decision arrived at by the Royal Commission of which Sir James Allport was chairman, and the recent Special Commission of Inquiry of which Sir John Ball Greene was chairman, and which held their sittings at Clifden and Galway. We beg therefore, to ask that the railway so approved be forthwith constructed. We ground our application on the utter necessity of this railway, and the important and widely extended interests which for years have pointed to the urgent requirement of this most desirable railway project.
