17th June 90 From the Constabulary at New Ross Station, reporting that one Walsh of Morkcullen purchased three young pigs from some person unknown at the public market on the 14th instant, and in a few hours afterwards the pigs died. The carcasses after being examined by the Veterinary Inspector were properly buried.

14th June 90 From the Veterinary Inspector reporting that the young pigs died in Swine Fever, and the person who sold them is unknown.

Sanitary.

The Rev. D. McAndrew, P.P. Athlery, wrote to the Guardians on the subject of out break of fever in portion of Burlinghmore Dispensary District, and requesting the Guardians to take effective steps to have this terrible visitant dislodged. In the case of Kelly of Bartlelaumont, one of the children had been stricken down five weeks before the Medical Officer was called in, and then three others of the family were in fever. The Medical Officers of Salway Nos 1 & 2, and Morkcullen Dispensary Districts, reported their respective Districts to be free from fever and to be in a fairly sanitary condition. The Medical Officer of Spiddal Disp. Dist. reported that there has been no fresh case of fever brought under his notice since the 22nd ult. All the patients are now convalescent. Three persons have neglected to comply with notice to abate nuisances.

Order - These three persons to be prosecuted.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland or others, relating to Sanitary Matters, were read, and directions given thereon as follows:—

No. 23687/90. 17th June. Referring to the report of the Medical Officer of Health of the Burlinghmore Dispensary District which was entered in Guardians' Minutes of the 11th instant, relating to the occurrence of cases of unacutated fever in the District, and pointing out that in addition to the measures of cleansing and disinfection, a most important means of preventing the spread of the disease is the isolation of the affected persons which could be most efficiently done by the removal of the persons, when isolation cannot be perfect in their homes, to the Fever Hospital. The Guardians would do well to use every means at their disposal to prevent any further spread of the disease. The Guardians are using every means at their disposal to prevent the spread of the disease, but the people will not, in some cases, report the sickness until the patients are unfit for removal to the Fever Hospital. Clothing and bedding used by the fever patients have been burned, and new clothing and bedding provided in lieu thereof.

Adverting to the resolution of the Guardians on the 25th ultimo proposing to reduce by one half the amount of the devaluation of Co-Collector Maherty for which his surety, Mr. C. M. Sweeney, is to be held liable, and inquiring whether the Guardians acted on legal advice in taking the unusual step of abandoning their claims on one of the sureties to a joint and several bond; and, if not, requesting that the Board may be informed of the reasons which influenced the Guardians in making such an arrangement.

The Guardians in this instance have not acted on legal advice in reducing the amount of Mr. Sweeney's liability to one half, but because they are convinced that the enforcement of the payment of the full amount would

would cripple him in his business, being only a struggling shopkeeper, and might compel him to take protection of the Courts.

Order. The Solicitor to be instructed to proceed against ex-collector, ^{Maherty} and the other sureties, and to sell the interest in their respective holdings of land in Inan Island.

24th June '90. From the War Office, on the subject of claim for a stoppage of pension of V. Marked for relief afforded his wife and children, between the dates 19th February and 10th May, 1890, stating that as Marked will have received his pension for the Quarter ending 30th Sept. next, before instructions could be conveyed to the Colonial Treasurer at Melbourne, the Secretary is unable to enforce a stoppage from the man's pension, in settlement of the claim of the Guardians.
