22nd July 90 From the Veterinary Inspector, reporting that 10 pigs at the Industrial School, Lower Salt Hill, were affected with Swine Fever, 1 died of the disease, 3 were slaughtered and the remaining 6 are now quite recovered from the disease. The carcasses of the 3 that were slaughtered and the one that died have been properly buried.
