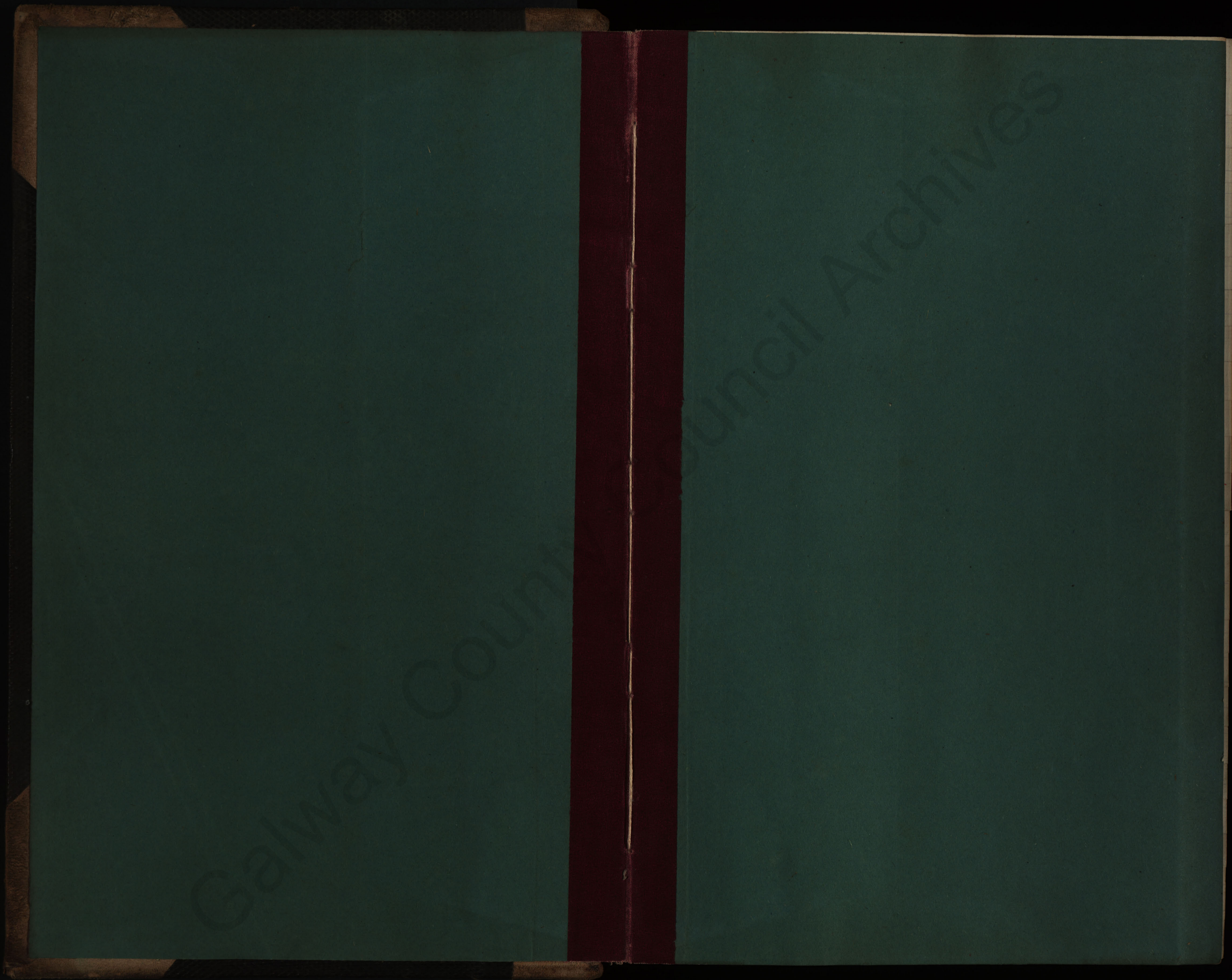

Mr Chairman and Gentlemen

In reply to the communication of the L. G. Board of the 4th inst requesting a written explanation from your medical officers as to their attendance at the fever hospital, we beg to repeat in writing for the information of the Board that the apparent brevity & irregularity of the visits of the medical officers to the fever hospital is due to two circumstances.

First that the admission of patients to the fever hospital is, they are glad to report extremely irregular - the hospital being sometimes for weeks and even months without a patient.

Secondly that when patients have recovered from their fever and are quite convalescent, they are still retained in hospital for some ten or fourteen days before being permitted to return home. During this period of convalescence the visits of the medical officer is a matter of form, and as already stated before the Board of Guardians the physician not infrequently meets his one or two convalescent patients walking exercise in the hospital grounds.

All cases of fever on their entrance and during the critical period of their course up to the time of convalescence receive the fullest & closest attention from the medical officers.

With regard to the report of my absence for two days, reference to my application and report book will satisfy the Guardians that my time was fully occupied, partly in town and partly in the Country district seeing after out relief cases and Vaccination defaulters.
