Read Letter from D. Conolly, Moycullen, dated 25th April, stating that

the local Government Inspector visited the Moycullen Dispensary on the 20th instant and recommended that a few shelves be immediately erected in it.

25th April '91. From D. Kean, Arran Island, stating that the following are the facts of the case in which D. Costello was brought to the Island during his short absence in Galway on Crown Summons on 21st ultimo. About noon on 21st ultimo a woman applied to the P.O. for a red ticket. At 1.30 pm a canoe with a crew of three was despatched at a charge of £1 to the North Shore for D. Costello. When the canoe left Arran the Galway steamer was in sight on her way to Arran. I was on board and arrived at 3.30 pm. Some after arriving I visited the case, a child 8 years old complaining of a stitch in her side. Immediately after getting a worm powder she got well. D. Costello arrived on Arran shortly after 7 o'clock pm. He told me

the letter from the P.O. contained no hint as to the nature of the case he was called upon to attend, nor was it stated whether it was a medical, surgical or midwifery case. D. Costello tried to elicit something about the patient from

from the crew of the canoe, but they could give him no information on the subject. D. Costello stated that if the nature of the illness had been communicated to him he would not have gone to Arran. The P.O. is several years in office and must have written several red tickets. It is printed on book that all possible information should be given to the Doctor. Why did he not do so in this case? Have been in Arran nearly 5 years, and the P.O. knows very well I have never left my district except on urgent business, and he also knows that I never delay after my business is done. I submit it was his duty to make use of that knowledge, and at least have waited the arrival of the steamer from Galway on his customary Saturday trip. The P.O. states he has instructions from the Local Government Board. If he have I venture to think the Board expect him to obey the spirit rather than the letter of their instructions which he failed to do in this case.

The provisions supplied to the Workhouse are of good quality with the exception of the bread which appears inferior.

The floors in many places throughout the Workhouse, especially in the Boys' School, are in need of repair, and the painting of the Buildings (including the Dispensary) should be completed without delay.

The Board trust that these matters will receive the careful consideration of the Guardians at an early date.

Ordered. The Rate Collectors in arrears to be called upon to proceed with greater energy in the discharge of their duties.

The Visiting Committee to be summoned to meet at the Workhouse on tomorrow at 1 o'clock to make arrangements for the repairs of floors, &c.
